## Procedure for Leave Of Absence (LOA) Application:

Member is to request LOA in writing and submit to President or Secretary. If submitted to President then President to forward application to Secretary

## Secretary to:

- 1. Log application in "Correspondence In."
- 2. Include in agenda for next board meeting
- 3. Advise Membership Director of LOA application (Membership Director to advise Welfare Officer if warranted.)

#### **Board Meeting**

After Board approval Secretary to:

- 1. Add to minutes of Board meeting
- 2. Advise Membership Director of outcome of application (in case he/she was absent from board meeting)
- 3. Advise Attendance officer of LOA approval. (This could be done by the Membership Director)
- 4. Advise Bulletin Editor of LOA for insertion in the Bulletin. (This could be done by the Membership Director)

If Board approval is not granted then Secretary to notify Membership Director (in case he/she was absent from meeting). Membership Director then to advise applicant of the Boards decision to reject LOA application and to advise Welfare Officer if warranted.
