Improved online RSA training course

On 3 June 2015, Deputy Premier the Hon. Troy Grant MP announced that the Responsible Service of Alcohol (RSA) course will be reinstated as an online delivered course from 1 July 2015, but there will be a restriction on which RTOs can deliver the course online.

Only TAFE NSW and approved industry associations (or selected providers nominated by them) will be able to deliver the course. During 2015/2016 a new course will be developed and will then be made available to other providers. The Office of Liquor, Gaming and Racing will oversee quality benchmarking of the course.

GROUP STUDY EXCHANGE 2015 / 2016 WITH DISTRICT 1890 NORTH GERMANY

TIME FRAME Inbound Team will arrive 02.04.2016 and depart 30.04.2016

Outbound team will depart 19.05.2016 and return 17.06.2016

THE TEAM consists of a Rotarian Team Leader and four (4) team members (more about the team members later)

WHERE – D1890 North Germany – the District runs from Hamburg north up to the border of Denmark with the North Sea on the west and the Baltic Sea on the east covering the provinces of Schleswig-Holstein, Hamburg and part of Lower Saxony to the south.

PURPOSE – a unique cultural and vocational exchange for young business and professional people at the start of their professional lives and covers a period of four (4) weeks staying with Rotarians where possible.

Team Leader Criteria as follows:

- Must be an experienced Rotarian
- > Not be a current District Governor, immediate past DG or DG Elect
- Remain with the team for the duration of the Exchange
- > Be willing and able, physically and mentally, to keep up to the pace of a GSE
- Not be accompanied on the exchange by a spouse, companion, or other relatives or dependents.

The ideal Team Leader – we offer the following suggestions

- Possess outstanding communication skills
- Makes an effort to have a few pertinent phrase of greeting and similar in order to communicate in the major language of the host District in this case - German
- > Have presentation and public speaking skills and is able to help the team prepare for presentations at Rotary Clubs
- ➤ Has the ability to imbue a team with a sense of mission
- > Understands that this is not a holiday but an experience or a lifetime.

Team Leader Applicants will be required to give both a written and ten (10) minute verbal outline on how they will prepare the team they will be leading.

Cost – The Rotary Foundation no longer supports this program. Depending on airfares and other essentials the full team will be required to pay Aus\$1,500 and the relevant Club an additional \$500 approx for economy airfares. This does not include out of pocket expenses whilst away.

GUEST SPEAKER – Christine Shewry – CEO Joblink Plus with her team – Craig, Rochelle, Emily

Summary of the problem:

The dilemma facing our young people today has its origins in the Global Financial Crisis, which Australia weathered relatively well but arguably at the cost of our young people (and the next generation of workers and taxpayers). In May 2012, the rate of unemployment for 15 to 19-year-olds was 18.8%; and for the broader group of 15 to 24-year-olds it was 13.1%. This compares to an unemployment rate of 5.8% for the population aged 15 to 64 years. February 2008 to October 2011 (the last Census date), there were 653,500 jobs added to the Australian economy, HOWEVER teenagers lost 67,100 jobs over the same period. Further around 52% of the total jobs added since February 2008 have been part-time. In October 1992, 33% of 15—24 year olds who had a job worked part-time. Today, it's more than 50%.

The <u>International Labour Organisation</u> and economists who study employment, like <u>Professor Bill Mitchell</u> from the Centre for Full Employment and Equity out of the University of Newcastle, have very sound reasoning behind their argument for a more accurate set of statistics that should alarm us and spur us to action. Professor Mitchell also highlights the falling participation rate as an indicator of a youth employment crisis. This means that increasing numbers of young people are opting out of receiving Centrelink benefits and the associated support services such as access to the PBS and subsidised medications. The knock-on effect is that young people cannot afford to see a GP or get a prescription filled. They rely on the cash they can get by whatever means, support from family if they have it, and charity.

What is the Joblink Plus response?

We use positive psychology in supporting people who are looking for work. We encourage them to think in terms of what they CAN do, not what they can't. We have honest conversations with young job seekers about what's required of them in order to find work, and assure them that we are part of their search in a hands-on way. Joblink Plus addresses some of the practical issues, such as not having a driver's license, not having the literacy skills to put together a résumé, or not having funds to buy clothes for an interview. We have targeted programs that make them "job ready" and create pathways to employment. We encourage paid and unpaid work experience with local employers, and have campaigns to raise awareness of the problem – and the solutions.

What can be your response?

As active members of your community Rotarians are perfectly positioned to influence the conversation about our young people. Next time you hear expressions like "young delinquents who don't want to work" continue your positive contribution to the narrative. Explain how difficult it can be for a young person, from university graduates to early school leavers alike. Share the stories you heard (ask us if you need more!) and focus on help, not blame. Employers who hire a young person are making an investment in the future of their business or trade. It will be some time before you see a return, but it's worth it! It is important to recognise that the main influence on a young person's employment prospects is outside their control. This is the rate of economic growth. It determines the pace at which jobs are created, and therefore the unemployment rate. There are many more things we can do together, but finally: part of the local assistance to young people making the transition from education to work should be a greater role for schools and suppliers of tertiary education in providing opportunities to engage with the workplace. The Career and Business Expo is crucial for this, and we at Joblink Plus look forward to being just one stakeholder in the 2016 Expo that promotes local employment opportunities.
