GUEST SPEAKER — one of our own — TIM COATES

Introduction - Peter Bell

Tim Coates has been a member of the Tamworth Chamber Board for ten years – two years as Vice President and eight years as President. He complimented Bruce Treloar and other local businessmen who had the foresight to start the Chamber some 50 years ago to promote business and professions in the City and surrounding district.

- The Chamber is now in a very strong position the largest in regional NSW with 413 members (Albury being the next closest in size).
- > Currently have one vacancy on the Board not replacing as the Annual General Meeting is fast approaching
- Wide spread of membership in business, service industries, manufacturing and corporate.
- > It is a not for profit organisation with sponsorship offered by members

What does the Chamber do? We organise or support areas such as

- ➤ Meet the Candidates (Federal, State and Local)
- ➤ Liaise and work with Council on projects such as" Keeping the Flight School in Tamworth" still waiting for an announcement
- ➤ "Water Pricing" a very sore point for both irrigators and Council in the Peel Valley Catchment by working with both State and Federal, we now have a Small Business Minister (some seven (7) million people are involved in small business
- ➤ Regional Forums seven in the State and nine in Sydney employment is main issue we come up with ideas / suggestions and approach both State and Federal governments
- > State Chamber CEO Steve Cartwright attends international Conference of Chambers and in 2017 the Conference will be held in Sydney a first for Australia
- Advocacy we assess and discuss the Award changes as they come through big issues at present is Hospitality and discussions taking place about reducing double time on Sundays back to 11/2 rates like Saturdays South Australia appears to have taken the initiative but NSW still in discussions
- ➤ Mentoring Youth program which has proved very successful and replaces the Queen of Country Music now organised by Tamworth Regional Council covering areas such as marketing, public relations, finance 41 have been successful over the past two years
- Organise Leader Forums some very successful, others not quite
- ➤ Development (manufacturing or residential) has been easier to liaise with Jackie Kruger and her department hoping that won't change back to earlier difficulties
- > Junior Chamber Joseph (Joe) Townsend sits on the Chamber Board and leads the Junior Chamber
- ➤ Tamworth Business Awards annually now held at TRECC with over 700 in attendance last year 31 categories over 1000 nominations hoping to touch 1,000 attendees this year tickets still available
- > Sponsorship instead of seeking just one sponsor, we have been successful in averaging twenty (20) sponsors at a set rate each year and aiming for this to continue in the future
- > NSW Chamber has a representative here Derek Tink for the first few years and Joe Townsend currently

Finally the Tamworth Chamber has become a "Who to go to" Centre for members.

- Q Abattoirs in this area has a large percentage of employees with 417 visas?
- A. About 1.2% of their workforce is on 417 visas. Baiada now paying proper rates to their workers.
- Q. Drug and alcohol is it an issue?
- A. All employees can be screened at any time up to 60% have been "caught" and will not be re-employed by any abattoir.



We need to support local people at the abattoirs – some 500 seeking work **but** they must comply in relation to drugs / alcohol which is an issue.

- Q. Uber is that an issue in Tamworth?
- A. Not at this time, there is a State enquiry it is seeking a "balance of services".

Students eager to meet the animals



Rockingham Beach Primary School Education Support students Chloe Townsend, 8, and Ben Watkins, 12, are grateful for the \$2000 generous donation from

Excitement was high at Rockingham Beach Primary School last week when Education Support students participated in their annual school camp. Student Ben Watkins, 12, said he was thrilled to be returning to Landsdale Farm School after having a brilliant time last year. "I'm very excited to help farmer Sandra feed the animals and make damper," he said.

Education Support principal Margaret Keen said travelling to the facility north of Perth was beneficial because it was specifically designed for students with disabilities. The camp helps to develop the children's independent life skills," she said. "For some children, it's their first night away from home and parents."

Mrs Keen said the camp would not be possible without the support of **Rockingham Rotary Club**, which for the past three years had donated a total of \$6000 to pay for the students' accommodation. "This year's \$2000 grant meant the camp was accessible for all students because it took the burden off parents," she said. Mrs Keen said the camp included 22 students from Years 1 to 7.

Rockingham Rotary president Darrel Donovan said each year the club offered grants to applicants in the community, seven of which were issued this year. "The grants are made possible by money raised at the Rotary Mart at Village Green," he said. "We grant the money because we know it's going to a good cause."
