

GUEST SPEAKER - DG MAURIE STACK AND DE

Maurie opened his "chat" by making us feel good about ourselves and our Club – congratulating the golfers on their outstanding fundraising and noting Pedal the Peel has become an outstanding success in just a few short years, the socialising with both the Rugby Club and the Post Office Hotel raffles, our involvement with "youth" through long term youth exchange, Science & Engineering Challenge.

He spoke about the importance of a positive outlook through a book such as "How to Win Friends and Influence People" by Dale Carnegie – still a best seller and people who influenced him such as "Weary" Dunlop and the importance of setting goals and remembering to re-set these and new goals.

This year's theme "Be a Gift to the World" covers all aspects of Rotary through RAWCS, Rotary Foundation, Australian Rotary Health and local projects. People join Rotary for different reasons – they want to give back and find it easier through a Club rather than as an individual but they stay because of the friendships that are generated.

Clubs certainly support the Rotary Foundation – however it would be good to see more donations being made by individuals. Worth checking via RAWCS the Rotary Australia Benevolent Society (RABS). Whatever funds were donated to the Rotary Foundation three years ago - 50% is returned to the District for special Club projects. When considering donations to other causes – remember that the Rotary Foundation is "our charity of choice" and all monies donated to a specific cause is spent on that cause, not spent on administrative costs.

Australian Rotary Health – De asked us to consider her project for the year – the **Jack Wilson Kidney Research Program** – a three year PhD research project aimed at improving long term outcomes for young children who are kidney transplant recipients. De and Maurie's first grandchild – Jack Wilson has major kidney issues and had a transplant (his father's kidney) last January – he is doing very well now **but** has to take a concoction of drugs every day for the rest of his life which can affect his immune system. De's aim is to raise \$33,000 for this Project which will be added to by the University and Rotary Down Under which will allow this research to happen.

Maurie and De completed their time with us with a sing-a-long as they played their ukulele and banjalalee. Thanked by Phil Heffernan in his own inimitable style....

ROTARY HAS A "CHALLENGE" FOR SEPTEMBER – EDUCATION AND LITERACY

As our District Governor spoke about the Rotary Australian Benevolent Society (RABS) - (a Public Benevolent Institution) it seems fitting to include this information under September's heading – Education and Literacy...

RAWCS has established the **Rotary Australia Benevolent Society** (ABN: 54 563 288 318) to assist Rotary Clubs and Rotary Districts within Australia to respond to needs within their own communities and to gain tax deductibility for donations made to their particular project.

RABS is a **public benevolent institution (PBI)** with full Australian Taxation Office certification. RABS Projects can be registered by Australian Rotary Clubs and Rotary Districts and a Rotary Club can only register one RABS project at a time. An open project must be in addition to registrations by Clubs - Rotary Districts can register up to two District projects.

The Australian Charities and Not-for-profits Commission (ACNC) Act requires that all Benevolent Society projects must address one of the following criteria that **arouse the compassion** of your community:

- Poverty
- Sickness
- Suffering
- Distress
- Misfortune
- Disability
- Destitution
- Helplessness

Projects may support disasters or the needs to individuals.

The main requirement for RABS projects is that they provide **direct relief to people in need**. If the clients are disadvantaged, the relief should target that disadvantage, such as a place to sleep for the homeless, food and support for those in poverty, counselling and support of those in distress. The relief provided is only for people. The project must also show that it works for a section of the community that clearly needs help, in other words 'people in need'.

A service fee of 3% will be deducted from all donations to RABS National, however donations to a project registered to respond to a declared disaster will be exempt from the 3% service fee. Donations from Rotarians and Rotary Clubs and Districts are also exempt.
