
In a Club our size, we must have an employee or two who would really benefit from such an opportunity – please consider.

ROTARY HAS A "CHALLENGE" FOR SEPTEMBER – EDUCATION AND LITERACY

Rotary Club of Croydon District 9810, Victoria Australia Rotary Club of Croydon - Literacy Project

- 1.0 Project Name: Rotary Literacy Program.
- 1.1 Project Overview. The Rotary Clubs of Croydon is currently working with Yarra Road Primary School to develop and implement an Oral Language Literacy Project.
- 1.2 Why select Oral Language? Oral literacy underpins all of our communication. It is essential for social interaction, clarifying thinking through questioning and the exploration of ideas. The staff at Yarra Road Primary School believe by providing a strong emphasis on oral literacy we can provide the opportunities for students to think out loud, strengthen their self-esteem by being clear and convincing communicators, and become more engaged members of the school and the local community.
- 1.3 What is included in Oral Language? Oral Language refers to both spoken and heard language. It includes; Expressive or speaking skills the ability to express our thoughts, feelings, ideas and opinions Receptive or listening skills including the ability to comprehend and understand what others are saying Pragmatic or social communication skills the ability to initiate and maintain discussion, use appropriate body language and the ability to actively listen to others.
- 1.4 Is there a need for an Oral Language Program at Yarra Road Primary School? Currently the students at Yarra Road Primary School perform at or slightly below the expected level for students of similar age and education level. Our wish is to implement a program that will raise standards in both speaking and listening skills for all students in the school population. The Project being planned will make available the opportunity for all students to improve their communication skills. The high achievers, the low achievers and the average achievers needs will all be addressed. Data on student performance in the oral language area from the past 2 years will be used as a bench mark on which to measure the success of the new initiative / program. The Yarra Road Primary School Oral Language Literacy Project will focus on the following areas:
- Communicating Orally (Ability to Learn Oral Language) addresses the necessary skills and their prerequisites for the acquisition of oral language.
- > Purposes of Communication addresses the use of oral language within our social communications.
- Conventions of Language addresses the rules governing the sounds, sentences and genres of oral language.
- ldeas Communicated addresses the meanings of words, sentences, discourse and topics of language
- 1.5 What benefits will the Oral Language Literacy Project offer the students? The introduction of a rigorous and diverse oral language program is aiming to improve speaking skills for all students. It is anticipated that students will show improvement in their achievement against Victorian Leaning Standards (recognised Victorian Education Department Standards) as measured by teacher assessment against standardised progression points. Our target is to for 90% of students to be performing at or above expected standard (age appropriate) by the end of year. Improve the student's participation with community and develop understanding of community issues through presentations and involvement in speaking and listening. With the help of Rotary and their network involvement, and our community links we aim to have at least 10 % of students participate in four (4) or more community events throughout the year. This may include presenting on community radio, competing in public speaking competitions etc.
- 1.6 How will students participate in the Oral Language Literacy Project? Yarra Road Primary School's oral literacy project is being designed to develop: Small group support program conducted by integration aides. The groups will be involved in structured activities to develop skills in expressive and receptive language. A range of games, speaking opportunities, and recording of conversations will feature in the activities. Challenge projects for students achieving excellence in oral language ...our program will develop a radio / news reporting activities that will be broadcast through the school at lunchtimes. Debating, public speaking and conversations with a range of people from different sectors of the community will be a feature of our extension program.

The interesting items we perused, from the newspapers cut into squares, a and hung on a peg in the lav, It took little to keep us amused..


The clothes were boiled in the copper, with plenty of rich foamy suds but the ironing seemed never ending as Mum pressed everyone's 'duds'.
