GUEST SPEAKER - Ben Davies

Ben opened with the fact that he was born in Wales into a family of general practitioners and very much the medical field. Ben's mother disliked Wales so the family moved to Bath – he is the outsider in his family as a "chef" – even his son has just started at the University of New England studying medicine with years of study ahead. Ben's daughter is going into year 12 at McCarthy, and the family live out at Kingswood so he still has rural scenery around him. This is the longest he has stayed in one place ever, he is a single parent with two children and the first people he met and made friends with in Tamworth were Simon Chamberlain and James Treloar.

Ben's career commenced in England at country hotels – he was never interested in working in cities. He gained his first Michelin star whilst working in the south of France after two years at the age of 23 – very young to be so successful. He returned to England and gained his next Michelin star at the Calcott Manor in Gloucestershire. In 1992 when the financial crash hit, the hotel went under. For the next decade he moved around Europe including another stint in France.

Ben worked for Sir Bernard Ashley (Laura Ashley – fashion designer) – he wanted the "best hotels in the world" and succeeded - so Ben spent a considerable amount of time in the USA. When Ben was in the States he spent most of his time travelling around doing charity dinners and menu building with chefs - again mainly in rural settings – Ben won his third Michelin star and moved back to England. Ben was lucky to cook for the G8 in 1998, and got to chat with Bill Clinton, Boris Yeltsin, Tony Blair etc, Interesting that the British chefs are now acknowledged as the best in the world.

Ben's wife actually came from Tamworth and many present probably knew his father-in-law – Maurie Pickering. He met Greg Maguire and told him all about his son in law who was a "cook" and should put him on. Greg suggested – being polite – that Ben send him his Resume which he did. However in the meantime he and his family moved to the Gold Cast and managed two restaurants. Worst experience of his life – absolutely hated his time on the Gold Coast – a totally soulless place. Finally decided to ring Greg and he moved down with his two children and has just loved everything – loves the district, the city, everything is here. Here nearly 10 years – 8 years in the kitchen and nearly two years as Manager.

Here in Tamworth he supports local produce which covers everything and always highlights "local" – Sydney very metro-centric – no idea really where their food comes from. The sandstone curtain is a major barrier relating to tourism. Tamworth businesses have good work ethics, can really build good relationships with the businesses he deals with.

Finally, the Powerhouse will go through a major facelift over next 18 months – Monty's and the Workshop first, kitchens to be more open plan, then rooms will be upgraded and end result will be a 5 star motel which is good for Tamworth.

Q. Will Monty's be changed? No, it will basically stay as is
