DISASTER AID WINS ROTARY AWARD IN SOUTH AMERICA

Rotary Districts in that country recently combined for their **2015 Golden Wheels Awards**. and DAI Chairman, **David Langworthy** was excited to hear from friends at the RCs de Plaza Matriz and Montevideo (Uruguay) that the RC Endeavour Hills was announced, "the winner of the International Category for its Disaster Aid International Rotary club project".

Maria Rezk, President of the Plaza Matriz club told David, "the ceremony was well attended, including the RI Regional Public Image Coordinator", adding, "our club is really proud. We even got the Ministry of Public Health to declare it an event of national interest!"

WORK CONTINUES IN PHILIPPINES AND VANUATU

In September, DAA sent the second of three large infrastructure placements to the **Philippines**. Ten **Sky Hydrants** (Australian water filtration system) were sent and received by our partner, the Balay Mindanaw Foundation.

An Australian DART (Disaster Aid Response Team member) re-visited **Vanuatu** in October following a deployment post-Cyclone Pam in March. Although there has been significant aid provided, small village communities are still affected with tarps still on some rooves.

The mobile sawmill (restored from funds donated to DAA), has enabled stronger buildings to be constructed. A central building used as a classroom (kindergarten to year 3) also doubles as a community meeting room. The people of Vanuatu are currently experiencing a drought and were delighted to see a returning Disaster Aid International DART from Australia.

NEW AID PRODUCTS We now use two new products **Sawyer Filters** for small family groupings, easily assembled to a small container (pictured). These were used in Nepal and are about to be sent to Vanuatu. That was from a Rotary Foundation Grant to **RC Wynyard**, Tasmania (D9830). and **Greenco Pak Flat** water tanks (https://greencowater.com/) recently deployed to Vanuatu by DAA complement the SkyHydrant™ systems.

DOMESTIC VIOLENCE update by two Committee members – Kylie Boyraz & Vicki Brean

Introduced – Paul Stevenson - Thanked - Graham Dooley

Domestic Violence week is 25.11.2015 to 10.12.2015 "Orange the World" is the theme and this is also supported and lead by United Nations

Kylie opened by thanking **our cyclists** and members who wear their special "No to Domestic Violence" tops when riding on Friday and Saturdays to show their support. This Committee is looking at the following

- > Create a memorial site for remembrance in the Botanic Gardens
- Tamworth High School's White Ribbon Day and an annual Rugby match advertising "No to Domestic Violence"
- Support offered by North Tamworth Rugby Club
- Creating a radio segment to talk about where to find help
- ➤ "Love Bites" created to support teenagers
- ➤ Police receive 300 domestic violence calls a week this is the major part of police work each day
- Looking at a similar idea to Blacktown have a purple sign under the street names to promote No to Domestic Violence
- Domestic Violence costs Australia some \$21.7B annually.
- ➤ We need to follow Sweden's program No 1 country for Gender Equality
- > Need to remember that victims do not ask to be raped or beaten or humiliated
- ➤ Parents set the standards that their children follow important that families work together to create a save home environment also liaise with sporting bodies, in the workplace, at schools that domestic violence is not acceptable in any form
- We can all name members of our cricket team, rugby or league players how many can name the top women cricketers considering that the Australian team in NO 1 in the World at the present time? This applies to other sports such as basketball as well.
- Paul Stevenson has agreed to be the co-ordinator of this initiative.

Lots of relevant information provided.

- Q. This increase in domestic violence caused by cultural barriers only happens in other countries?
- A. No it is the same everywhere often increased because of arranged marriages (example 11 year old girl made to marry a 70 year old man). Tamworth has a good multi-cultural image some of the major issues we have is that the women do not come forward to report domestic violence, we are aware of certain situations but are not able to act unless the woman comes forward.
- Q. 300 referrals in just Tamworth really?
- A. 3,600 referrals in Tamworth per annum. The police are fully aware that the majority of the calls are repeat calls but still have to respond. Over 100,000 DVO's sought each year. More often than not the woman does not turn up in court so the DVO lapses.
- Q. Does domestic violence only occur in certain cultural backgrounds and do you think the program :RUOK?" works?
- A. Domestic Violence can occur in any level of society from the wealthiest to the poorest it has no relevance to cultural or religious backgrounds. By asking the question "RUOK?" at least lets the person know of your concern or awareness without you actually interfering in their lives. We try to stay in touch if you are concerned don't give up. Cruelty to children and animals often how domestic violence starts or is the threat over the woman's head so pain is inflicted on her to protect the children / animals in an unpleasant situation. Often the woman is so traumatised, she is unable to think her way through to an exit from her current situation. We need to be there to help, to be available to solve a situation.

A heart-warming story for Christmas

This story was written by a doctor who worked in South Africa

One night I had worked hard to help a mother in the labour ward but in spite of all we could do, she died, leaving us with a tiny, premature baby and a crying two-year-old daughter. We would have difficulty keeping the baby alive, as we had no incubator (we had no electricity to run an incubator).

We also had no special feeding facilities and although we lived on the equator, nights were often chilly with treacherous drafts. One student midwife went for the box we had for such babies and the cotton wool that the baby would be wrapped in.

Another went to stoke the fire and fill a hot water bottle - she came back shortly in distress to tell me that in filling the bottle, it had burst (rubber perishes easily in tropical climates). "It was our last hot water bottle!" she exclaimed. "All right", I said "put the baby as near the fire as you safely can and sleep between the baby and the door to keep it free from drafts. Your job is to keep the baby warm."

The following noon, as I did most days, I went to have prayers with any of the orphanage children who chose to gather with me. I gave the youngsters various suggestions of things to pray about and told them about the tiny baby. I explained our problem about keeping the baby warn enough, mentioning the hot water bottle and that the baby could so easily die if it got chills. I also told them of the two-year-old sister crying because her mother had died.

During prayer time, one ten-year old girl, Ruth prayed with the usual blunt conciseness of our African children. "Please God" she prayed "Send us a hot water bottle today, it'll be no good tomorrow as the baby will be dead so please send it this afternoon."

While I gasped inwardly at the audacity of the prayer, she added "And while You are about it, would You please send a dolly for the little girl so she'll know You really love her?" As often with the children's prayers, I was put on the spot - Could I honestly say "Amen"? I just did not believe that God could do this. Yes – I know that He can do everything; the Bible says so. But there are limits, aren't there? The only way God could answer this particular prayer would be by sending me a parcel from the homeland. I had been in Africa for almost four years at that time and I had never, ever received a parcel from home. Anyway, if anyone did send me a parcel, who would put in a hot water bottle? I live on the equator!

Half-way through the afternoon, while I was teaching in the nurses' training school, a message was sent that there was a car at my front door. By the time I reached home, the car had gone, but there on the verandah was a large 22lb parcel. I felt I could not open the parcel alone, so I sent for the orphanage children. Together we pulled off the string, carefully undoing each knot. We folded the paper, taking care not to tear it unduly. Excitement was mounting – some 30 / 40 pairs of eyes were focused on the large cardboard box. From the top I lifted out brightly-coloured knitted jerseys. Eyes sparkled as I gave them out. Then there were the knitted bandages for the leprosy patients and the children looked a little bored. Then came a box of mixed raisins and sultanas – that would make a batch of buns for the weekend.

Then as I put my hand in again, I felt - could it really be? I grasped it and pulled it out — Yes! A new rubber hot water bottle. I cried - I had not asked God to send it - I had not truly believed that he could. Ruth sitting in the front row of the children rushed forward, crying out "If God has sent the bottle, He must have sent the dolly too!!"

Rummaging down to the bottom of the box, she pulled out the small, beautifully dressed dolly. Her eyes shone! She had never doubted! Looking up at me, she asked "Can I go over with you and give this dolly to that little girl so she'll know that Jesus really loves her?"

"Of course" I replied. That parcel had been on the way for five whole months, packed by my former Sunday school class, whose leader had heard and obeyed God's prompting to send a hot water bottle, even to the equator. One of the girls had put in a dolly for an African child – five months before, in answer to the believing prayer of a ten year old to bring it "that afternoon".

"Before they call, I will answer." (Isaiah 65:24). When you receive this, say the prayer – no strings attached. Prayer is one of the best free gifts we receive. There is no cost but a lot of rewards.....



"Heavenly Father, I ask you to bless my friends. I ask You to minister to their spirit. Where there is pain, give them Your peace and mercy. Where there is self-doubting, release a renewed confidence to work through them. Where there is tiredness or exhaustion, give them understanding, guidance and strength. Where there is fear reveal Your love and release to them Your courage. Bless their finances, give them greater vision and raise up leaders and friends to support and encourage them in Jesus' name. Amen"

Some items left over from Wednesday, 2 December 2015:

2013/2014 Treasurer – Phil Penman confirmed that the Club's accounts had been moved to MYOB software which had proved quite painless and with Dennis Maunder keeping track of progress, it had been an easy transition. Phil thanked Dennis Maunder and his special off-sider – Bec for their assistance.

2014/2015 Treasurer – Michael Smith confirmed an amount of \$73,000 across all Club accounts – Revenue raised \$65,000 – Pedal the Peel \$3,700, Pub Raffles - \$2,400 and Fine sessions \$1,900. Only small negative – breakfast expenses are a little too high.

Club Foundation – Phil Heffernan confirmed that the Committee had assessed and checked against original concept back in 2003 – it was set up along the lines of the International Foundation. The next Board meeting will assess and possibly implement a few small changes. Once the fund reaches \$100,000 then the interest will go into general revenue for appropriate use. However the fund will continue to grow annually and the interest rates will rise and fall but this will generate a perpetual income. Centurion program, Phil Heffernan has relevant forms for anyone interested in taking this up - \$100 per annum towards a Paul Harris Award.

Club Administration – Val Hellmann – our move to Diggers has proved quite successful and our Christmas dinner at Futures went exceptionally well – particularly having our new member, Dimity and her fiancé and father attending as well. We have an excellent group of younger members but we also need our retirees who so kindly assist during working days when others have to work! Our membership director, Laurie is doing a great job. Welfare – we need to let Maureen Thornton know if a member is ill so that she is able to respond. We know that the Yeo's are in our thoughts and a working bee will be formed to help them in any way we can. One of the nicest things about this Club is that we have fun, provide a friendly atmosphere for visitors and speakers, helps our personal development and overall we are lucky to have peace in Tamworth.

Service Projects – Helen Tickle – two vocational visits being arranged – Hopscotch in January and Taminda a little further on. **Careers Expo Committee** is working very well as a team and a date to be confirmed in May. Need suggestions for exhibitors – aiming for the Careers Expo to be self-funding this year – looking at a \$70 registration fee. Have just received a cheque for \$2,000 from Tamworth Regional Council – a donation towards last May's Career Expo presented to Christine Shewry, CEO Joblink Plus. **RYAG Equine** will be held in 2016 – Barry Biffen has guaranteed that it will happen. **RYLA** – please contact Louise with your prospective entrants aged 18 – 25 year olds – a career changing experience.

President Elect Terry Robinson spoke briefly about his aims and goals for the Club in 2016 / 2017. Knows that he has an excellent Committee and with the support of members it will be a great year. His aim is to keep the Club dynamic, vibrant, youthful and relevant to today's world and to be fun and rewarding to members. We will aim for interesting social events to involve partners – a Club that functions socially also functions to serve the community well. Rotary is a voluntary service Club and members can gain confidence and skills through friendship, communication, organising events with a good backup team, unique opportunities to step out of one's comfort zone, great speakers generate new ideas and skills and at the same time we have fun and fellowship. "You will get far more out of Rotary personally than you give." I look forward to following President Graeme's example of good leadership and direction and continue to grow with Rotary.
