

GUEST SPEAKER Chief Inspector Phil O'Reilly

Introduced by Laurence Hearne Thanked by Bruce Hemmett

Chief Inspector Phil O'Reilly provided a slide presentation and opened with ICE is a scourge everywhere and getting worse. The ICE Forum held in Tamworth on 13 January last included all appropriate personnel including Troy Grant (State Police Minister) and proved very successful. Kevin Anderson is forming a specific working group which should be in place within six weeks of this meeting.

Demonstrating the increase in ICE usage – in 2014 29 people were charged for possession – however in 2015 43 were charged for possession and 24 with both supply and possession.

Strikeforce Mulholland Target Action Group (TAG) covered a period of months and resulted in discovery of firearms as well. These were being used to protect the suppliers against other suppliers. An increase in stolen goods by users to "pay" for their drugs – ICE specifically.

Strikeforce Mewburn covered a period from July 2014 through to August 2015
Strikeforce Codes covered Gunnedah concluding in February 2015
Strikeforce Rutter covered Tamworth and many of these cases are either currently in court or about to be brought to court so unable to discuss specific details.

The police are becoming more aware of Mental Health episodes – an 18% increase from 2014 to 2015 and increasing. They are having to attend more domestic disputes, which are drug and alcohol related incidences, shoplifting mentioned earlier but increasing at a faster rate to feed their habit.

From September to December 2015 some 580 drivers tested - 128 were positive - 43 with ICE. 15 for both cannabis and ICE - 45% for ICE.

Police are facing additional danger with used syringes, ICE is initially smoked in an ICE pipe but as they get used to the hit, they then inject for a stronger hit.

Our Target Action Group consists of four (4) police so unable to follow every lead via Crime Stoppers or feedback from other police but try to join leads where possible to have a strong lead to follow. Strangely motor vehicle theft and break and enter crime statistics are actually down.

Most successful results are through long term surveillance as above. ICE is easy to obtain – mostly 0.1pt for \$100 and long standing local addicts say that ICE is the best hit ever.

- 5. Ease of obtaining the drug easy to make from readily available ingredients, can be made in the home or in a shed, by cooking in a saucepan.
- 6. **Type of Drug** users love the feeling they get from the drug. A well-known Tamworth User of all types of drugs recently told a GD's Officer that ICE is the greatest drug he has ever taken.
- 7. **Pyramid selling techniques used by major dealers** happy to sell more drugs to a user and encourage them to on-sell drugs to their friends Exponential increase in the amount of suppliers and increases their user base.
- 8. Lack of Rehabilitation Centres in Tamworth— need to get users off the drug. Reduced demand will reduce the flow.
- 9. **Need for more education in Schools** need to target all children in Year 7 high schools or earlier– ICE specific education about the dangers. Need to ensure Children at Risk are targeted for education.
- 10. **Need for Juvenile Justice Programs** for all Young Offenders to be placed on Drug Education programs to reduce the risk of them becoming involved in Drug Crime.
- 11. **Ease of Concealment** Difficult to locate during Person & Vehicle searches Drug Dog in Tamworth is imperative to assist in this regard hopeful that the current dog handler will be selected for Drug Dog training in foreseeable future.

Finally there is a lack of local support for families and users in **Tamworth – Family Drug Support number is 1800 368 186** and they can refer a person or family member to other support in Tamworth.

- Q Gaols are full does this mean that magistrates are giving lighter sentences?
- A Gaols are full often have to keep a prisoner in the cells here until a bed can be found
- Q Do you think that we will ever get on top of the ICE / drug addiction?
- A Apparently additional funds are coming to try to increase services to assist families and addicts and for the police as well.
- Q Do you feel anything positive actually came out of the ICE Forum?
- A Working Party being formed to generate an Action Plan through Kevin Anderson plus increased reporting through Crime Stoppers.

- The **DAA Executive** and **DARTs** held a discussion day on Sunday 8 November that included ideas exchange, direction focus and goal setting. It was seen by all as a positive exercise in communication as well as understanding the development of the organisation.
- \cdot DAA is excited to be attending two **Western Australian Rotary District Conferences** early next year and to be given the opportunity to share information about our project with our Rotary colleagues in the west.
- · Disaster Aid is currently in discussions following enquiries from within **Rotary District 3460** (**Taiwan**) about the possibility of forming **Disaster Aid Taiwan** and becoming an associate of Disaster Aid International. Those discussions have been very encouraging.
- · In May 2016 DAA and DAI directors will meet to strengthen relationships with Rotarians in **Colombia, South America** and pursue a Rotary Foundation grant aimed at providing Australian SkyHydrant[™] water filters to some eighty (80) Colombian schools.
