GUEST SPEAKER - David Burley - Roulettes 1979 - 81

David Burley joined the Air Force as soon as he left school. He flew helicopters as well and going through various promotions landed up as a Flying Instructor at Sale in Victoria. Part of being a flying instructor is that you become part of the Roulettes Air Acrobatic Team and he was the Leader from 1979 through to 1981 and was part of the Diamond Jubilee celebrations of the RAAF in 1981. Usually the team consisted of five aircraft but for the Jubilee Year this was increased to seven. The Team flew Macchi MB326H aircraft.

After retiring from the Air Force he moved to Ballarat and was a pilot for Mission Aviation to Papua New Guinea, was at BAE Systems in Tamworth for some 18 months and joined the Civil Aviation Authority based in Tamworth. He has been retired for the past three years and enjoying the freedom that retirement offers.

We watched the Roulettes in action for the Diamond Jubilee – 16 minutes was the length of the display. It was very interesting but certainly showed how cinema photography has changed and progressed so much since then.

Q Flying as close to the aircraft in front – was it necessary to stay away from the wake?

A Yes – we stayed just below the "smoke" or turbulence.

Q When turning – how do you judge the speed?

A The Leader calls and the wingmen hang on to keep up / slow down as required – concentration is at maximum levels throughout a demonstration – always watching the Leader - hence very tiring but exhilarating when you land.

David spoke about the "Red Sails" – The Leader had called for a barrel role and misjudged and flew into the ground – the team concentrating so much on him all followed him into the ground – all were killed.

Q Do the pilots tune their aircraft?

A Yes – although each aircraft is technically the same, each are slightly different to fly so we each had our own specific craft to fly – some were slightly faster, slower, heavier and each knew everything about their specific craft.

A really interesting and entertaining breakfast.














1. Law of Mechanical Repair -After your hands become coated with grease, your nose will begin to itch and you'll have to pee.
