



D9650 & CLUB SPEAKER - PP Di Ford

Di Ford opened by saying that Interplast is a "Not for Profit" organisation working to improve the lives of people in developing countries who are disabled as a result of congenital or acquired medical conditions.

Interplast Australia and New Zealand was established in 1983 through a partnership between Rotary and the Royal Australasian College of Surgeons and Rotary continues to be integral to the operations of Interplast and welcoming Interplast teams to their Rotary meetings.

Two essential areas of support include subsidising the cost of patients travelling from remote locations and transporting our teams and equipment to and from the chosen site.

The World Health Organisation estimates that there are two (2) **billion** people with no access to basic surgical care. An example is in Papua New Guinea there is currently one (1) qualified plastic and reconstructive surgeon for a population of 7.5 **million** people.

Since 1983 Interplast has conducted

- Over 750 programs
- More than 40,000 consultations
- More than 23,000 surgeries
- Trained countless medical staff

Interplast

In the 2013 - 2014 year Interplast conducted 58 programs with plans to cover over 70 programs for this 2015 - 2016 year.



Julien Smith always keen to ask a question or two....







Q How does Interplast jump through all the hoops to get to these destinations?

A Through the Royal Australasian College of Surgeons who do have some clout but **must have local support**

Q How do these people cope with pain management both before and after surgery?

A Not well – however people in third world countries do manage pain better than us – they are tougher because they have nothing to compare against it. The will have the basics – Panadol etc. However, all Interplast teams carry all products that are well within their use-by dates and these are left behind for the patients.

Q How long does each Interplast team go for?

A Usually two weeks, occasionally longer. All patients seen on the previous visit will be re-checked to ensure that both the operation and healing were effective

Q Three (3) children in one family with a similar condition – genetic or diet?

A Probably a combination of both – chance of survival can be limited as there is no palate to the roof of the mouth so the children are unable to chew or swallow or talk properly

Q ROMAC – what is the difference between the two?

A Interplast can treat a larger number of people each trip – ROMAC can usually only treat the most difficult cases and the person can be in Australia (Brisbane, Sydney, Melbourne) being supported by Rotarians for up to two years.

Q Is our Papua New Guinea project still continuing?

A Definitely.












Each Rotary month has a different Theme – the month of March is WATER AND SANITATION

Clean water is a basic need for human beings. When people, especially children, have access to clean water, they live healthier and more productive lives. However, at least 3,000 children die each day from diseases caused by unsafe water, which is what motivates our members to build wells, install rainwater harvesting systems, and teach community members how to maintain new infrastructure.

While very few people die of thirst, millions die from preventable waterborne diseases, providing the impetus for our members to also improve sanitation facilities in undeveloped countries. Members start by providing toilets and latrines that flush into a sewer or safe enclosure and then add education programs to promote hand-washing and other good hygiene habits.



India's water supply to drop by 50%

"Groundwater levels are falling as India's farmers, city residents and industries drain wells and aquifers. What water is available is often severely polluted. The future may be worse, with the national supply predicted to fall 50% below demand by 2030. Enter the India Water Tool 2. 0, a new web platform. It's the most comprehensive, publicly

available online tool yet to evaluate India's water risks.

Created by a group of companies, research organizations, and industry associations-including WRI and coordinated by the World Business Council for Sustainable Development (WBCSD)-the tool can help companies, government agencies, and other water users identify their most pressing challenges and carefully target waterrisk management efforts.



Bench Terracing Works!

The Rotary Club of Poona, Rotary District 3131, India has undertaken a major Watershed Management Global Grant Project. The project is for US \$155,000 and is located in the Village of Masobawadi, Dist. Sangamner, an area of around 50 hectares which has scanty rainfall. To manage & utilize runoff water for useful purposes, protect, conserve and improve the land for efficient & sustained production, rainwater is captured as it runs downhill. The Project, expected to be completed by 2016, will reduce soil

erosion, increase infiltration of rain water and provide livelihood to the villagers. Bench Terracing brings sloping land into different level strips to enable conservation of water & cultivation. It consists of construction of step like fields along contours by half cutting and half filling. The original slope is converted into level fields.
