

## The School of St Jude

#### FIGHTING POVERTY THROUGH EDUCATION

(Arusha, Tanzania) Generous Rotarian of Tamworth are about to have their very first chance to see firsthand the difference they are making in one of the world's poorest countries.

Now offering free education to more than 1900 impoverished students, The School of St Jude in Tanzania was established by former Aussie teacher Gemma Sisia and continues to be primarily funded by Australians from across the country.

Gemma is so proud of last year's inaugural secondary graduates, most of whom are currently completing a voluntary year teaching in severely under-resourced government schools. She is bringing one of those lucky high-achievers to Australia this month to share what a difference St Jude's is making in Tanzania.

Bubbly, bright Dorice Livingstone joined St Jude's after finishing in the top 10% of a government primary school, and has been using her high-quality education to give back to the community as a biology teacher.

"When I was in a government school it was hard," Dorice said. "Sometimes the teacher was at class; sometimes she wasn't. We spent from morning until night without any food and we didn't have any books.

"Because I was at St Jude's (in high school) I passed Form 4 (Grade 10) very well and Form 6 very well."

Just 2.4% of the 1.63 million Tanzanian students that enrolled in their first year of school with Dorice completed their secondary schooling. Dorice and her female class mates, who make up more than 50% of the St Jude's population, are vital to a thriving future in Tanzania.

#### FIGHTING POVERTY THROUGH EDUCATION

Women receiving a first-rate education help break the cycle of poverty, are less likely to die in childbirth or marry early and against their will, and are more likely to have healthy children that they send to school.

This final point is key, as UNICEF's latest figures show only 24.4% of females currently attend secondary school in Tanzania. According to the United Nations Development Programme, most girls in Tanzania have left school by their 12th birthday after just 4.5 years of education, and more than 1 in 10 will have a baby by age 19.

St Jude's is playing a leading role in turning these trends around.

Not only did Dorice's graduating class rank in the top 10% nationally, all of them passed and more than half of them achieved the highest possible mark. The past year has been a particularly special one for Dorice and Gemma, who want to share their story and express the entire St Jude community's gratitude, when they visit Tamworth, this month.

"The School of St Jude now has almost 2000 students who have a real chance to escape poverty and receive a high-quality, life-changing education. It's a dream that I've worked hard on building for more than 15 years now, and these amazing students and their families would never have had the opportunity without the wonderful support of Australians like the Rotary Club of Tamworth," Gemma said. "I'm especially proud of our graduates, who are earning rave reviews as they volunteer at local government schools. I can't wait to introduce Dorice to Australia!"


Gemma's inspiring story has been featured twice on the ABC's Australian Story, and in 2007 she was honoured with an Order of Australia medal for her achievements.

## New England North West Westpac Rescue Helicopter Service – Tamworth Volunteer Support Group

I have been a member of the Tamworth Volunteer Support Group for the Westpac Rescue Helicopter Service, which provides free aeromedical retrieval and transport throughout our region, for nearly ten years.

The Tamworth Support Group runs fundraising activities to assist in covering the cost of providing this essential service by running raffles throughout the year as well as running the successful Balladeers Concert at Kootingal during the Country Music Festival, supporting BBQ's and assisting at other events as and when presented.

During the period since the formation of the Tamworth Support Group, shortly after the first helicopter was based here in Tamworth in 2000, to the present date the Group has raised more than \$633,000 helping to ensure no one ever has to pay.

As with many local community organisations, the Tamworth Support Group numbers have been dropping off in recent times and this has greatly increased the involvement needed from the remaining members.

With the support of members of your club we can turn this around as the Rescue Helicopter Service moves into a new era over the next twelve months and the Westpac Rescue Helicopter Service bases in Tamworth, Lismore and Newcastle join together under a new contract with NSW Ambulance to cover the majority of NSW north of the Hawkesbury with four new, and larger helicopters.

If the Tamworth Support Group numbers can be increased to the numbers of five or six years ago the commitment needed from each member would be reduced to around four or five hours a month on average, with one session on the roster, plus attendance at the monthly meeting held on the third Wednesday of each month at 6.03pm, where the following months rosters are made.

The next meeting of the Tamworth Volunteer Support Group is to be held on

Wednesday, 16 March 2016 at 6.30pm – Chillingworth Room West Tamworth Leagues Club

It would be great if some of your club's members, and/or someone they know, could come along to that meeting (or a third Wednesday in the future) to hear what we do.

Absolutely no obligation however I hope members may then see their way clear to joining the support group and benefiting the Westpac Rescue Helicopter Service.

## Each Rotary month has a different Theme – the month of March is WATER AND SANITATION



#### Water and Sanitation

Clean water is a basic need for human beings. When people, especially children, have access to clean water, they live healthier and more productive lives.

However, at least 3,000 children die each day from diseases caused by unsafe water, which is what motivates Rotarians to build wells, install rainwater harvesting systems, and teach community members how to maintain infrastructure.

While very few people die of thirst, millions die from preventable waterborne diseases, providing the impetus for Rotarians to also improve sanitation facilities in underdeveloped countries. Projects start by providing toilets and latrines that flush into a sewer or safe water enclosure and then add education programs to promote handwashing and other good hygiene habits.

Jack Sim, founder of the World Toilet Organisation, has used humour to draw attention to sanitation issues. By age 40, he was a successful entrepreneur running 16 businesses. He had enough money to retire, so started searching for a neglected cause to which he could devote his time and effort.

Realising that people did not want to talk about toilets, he set about making the humble commode into a media darling, founding the World Toilet Organisation in 2001 and holding a special day every year to draw attention to sanitation. Sim credits Rotary with helping him break the taboo around the subject. "By making people laugh," Jim noted, "they will listen to you.

Everyone has their personal horror toilet stories, whether about their travels or about their children, so just let the conversation flow naturally and everybody will talk about toilets. In fact, once they feel it's a legitimate topic, they won't stop. Even schoolchildren in the slums have cell phones yet they have no toilets."

Jim states that as Rotarians we must shift our focus from water to water and sanitation.
