Be a gift to the world **Chris Watson spoke about his recent trip to Fiji** – not something he wishes to repeat in a hurry and made him re-think future plans for he and his family – it was very scary but must have been terrifying on the other side of the island.

- ◆ They flew into Fiji on 19 March last and the wind just got stronger and stronger
- ◆ Concern grew when they saw windows being boarded up mattresses then wood at their hotel
- There were only 11 in the resort at that time and they were told there was a "safe house" further up the hill – if required
- They then heard that all planes had been cancelled from Sydney did not inspire confidence
- ✤ Staff stayed with us to try to keep all of us safe
- ◆ Finally, about midnight we were taken up to the bunker now a Category 5 and no power
- Our family stayed huddled together with our baby daughter, Charlotte, as the noise grew and grew – was really loud and frightening
- ✤ Once over, the eleven of us went out to villages to see what we could do to assist them our resort was basically OK
- ✤ We went further afield and saw shocking scenes of destruction
- ✤ We started to fund-raise these people have absolutely nothing. We have raised \$10,000 so far and hope the Club may be able to support financially as well
- We want the money to go direct to the people they need to buy rainwater tanks and similar and help with rebuilding their schools and, where possible, their homes – they have nothing
- Note The Club will certainly consider at the next Board meeting.



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#### Group Study Exchange with Germany – Katie Penman is our applicant and Team Member

Katie noted that the German Team would be arriving shortly and she was getting quite excited now their departure was getting closer. Katie is a dietician and she thanked our Club for our support. The team will be flying to Hamburg to meet their counterparts again in May – the team will be going to D1890 in north Germany. Both teams have a male Rotarian Team Leader and two males / two females make up the teams. The German team will be in Tamworth from Sunday afternoon, 14 April and depart for Taree and the District Conference on Thursday late morning to be met by Taree Rotarians at Nowendoc.

Katie is excited about the opportunity of discussing her field of work and comparing notes about how we both do things and learning from the experience. She will enjoy the sightseeing available and making new, long term friends for when she decides to go travelling. Katie finished by saying that she was looking forward to speaking to our Club again on her return.

#### Vocational

- A Vocational Visit was undertaken on Wednesday 16th March to Tamworth Frames and Trusses Taminda. Most informative in gaining knowledge and understanding of one of our Taminda businesses.
- Careers Expo to be held on Wednesday, 18 May at TRECC.
   Plans are well underway. Monthly meetings are held with our Careers Expo partner, JobLink Plus.
   Exhibitor registrations are coming in. An exhibitor registration fee of \$70 has been charged this year to help offset expenses. There has been no resistance to the charge. An exhibitor fee is common practice at Expos and similar types of events
- A \$2000 Grant Application to Tamworth Regional Council (Annual Donations Program) was successful. Application is underway to DET for funding (usually \$2000)
- Jo Townsend, NSW Business Chamber, has organised 4 5 speakers to make 15 minute presentations throughout the day, in the front room at TRECC.

#### Science & Engineering Challenge – Tuesday – Thursday, 22-23 March

Very successful with 850 students and 20 schools participating. Under financial pressure with increases in TRECC and University fees.

### **Rotary Foundation Report - Director Phil Heffernan**

- The Rotary Foundation is the charitable arm which Rotary International supports and administers.
- > As of Wednesday, 15 June last the Foundation had nett assets of \$964m.
- Polio Eradication During the fifteen (15) financial years the Foundation distributed \$131 million for Polio eradication (bringing the total amount for Polio to over \$1 Billion). \$94 million in grants; \$25 million to Districts; and \$69 million in Global grants.
- Our Club contributes our fine money directly to the Foundation equating to \$5/\$6000 per annum.
- The main contributions from the Foundation revolve around Peace / conflict prevention and treatment, Community and economic development, Literacy and (WASH) water sanitation and hygiene.
- PRID John Boag addressed our Club on Wednesday, 4 November last. He gave us many examples of how the Foundation is administered and the use of Funds.
- Our Club, through PP Di Ford is making application to the Foundation for a \$30K "Matching Grant" for use at the PNG Hospital our club has visited and continues to support on numerous occasions.

**Our own Club Foundation** has a balance of \$84K at present. When this amount arrives at the \$100K agreed then interest can be disbursed on an annual basis.

- Our Facebook page has exceeded all expectations with over 1,500 viewers and has now gone global with viewers from as far afield as Africa and Japan
