Kylie Steel- Fitness Modelling

Originally from Bendemeer, our guest speaker was Kylie Steele. She was raised by her father and enjoyed Rodeo competitions in Australia and the United States of America, where she lived for 6 years.

Back in Australia Kylie decided that her rodeo and marathon running day were over.

She investigated MMA fighting and fitness modelling. The modelling was chosen and now the big changes came. No more running and lots of changes to diet and lots of time in the weights room

.

The special supplements and training program have helped Kylie to gain muscle and sculpture her sleek body. She has chosen the INBA program, which is drug free.

Calculating the cost of special foods (chicken, fish, steak and 'buckets' of green vegetables), the bikini at \$400, shoes and makeup (for competitions), and coaching at \$120 per week, Kylie estimates that the cost of her life style activity is \$12,000 per year. This she manages with employment in the legal profession, teaching and sponsorship with DJ and 360.

Kylie competes in the 40+ and open competition for girls 18 to 50.

For 12 weeks before the competition she has a very clean eating program with supplements, reduced calories, 6 meals per day, phases out carbs and increases her protein intake.

Her great success is being National champion -1st in the 40+, 1st in the 30+ and 2nd in the All Round. Unfortunately Kylie is relocating to Sydney.

We want to get club managements thinking, if they are




