Dan Haslam's doco "A Life of its Own" debuts this Friday night, the 16th of September at the Forum 6 at 7.00 pm which a number of Rotary members will be attending. Rebecca Linich-PTSD

Rebecca gave us an emotional talk on her journey through Post Traumatic Stress Disorder. Accompanied by her Companion Dog Tucker, she spoke of her struggle with working her job as an RN at Bupa and looking after her husband who also suffers from PTSD. Both are returned active service personel; she is a navy nurse and her husband an army infantry soldier. She recalled the instance when he was engaged in a bombing attack in Afghanistan, when he ran the wrong way and a bomb landed beside him which did not explode, thus saving his life, but having an emotional effect on him for the rest of his life. Rebecca recalls the day she could not contact her husband who was at home on their acreage at Dungowan, and upon her arrival home she opened the door to what looked like crime scene, blood all over the room leading to the bedroom where he was lying on the bed covered in blood. Due to her training she was able to revive him from certain death.

During her presentation, Tucker roamed around the room as she told us how her companion dog gives her the confidence to tackle the daily challenges. How he goes to work with her a Bupa and the residents there take great care of him during the day.
