Dimity spoke about growing up in Tamworth and on a farm. She shared many childhood memories of days spent swimming in the dams, making cubbies in the gullies, bike rides, long bushwalks, having cows, goats, horses and 30,000 chickens as pets.

Dimity was the third born to Annette and Phil Chaseling and has a big brother Tim, big sister Wendy and little sister Emma. Dimity attended Tamworth East Primary then Oxley High School, completing year 12 in 2004.

She first went overseas to Malaysia in 1997 as an 11 year old, to a World Pheasant Association (WPA) conference. The WPA also took her on trips to Nepal and Thailand. Whilst in Nepal she met the then Prince of Nepal (he is now the King). Some other travel highlights included China, on one of Mr Green's Oxley trips; Myanmar, at the time Aung Sun Suu Ki was released; Alaska, visiting Rob's brother and sister in law who live there; and New Zealand, a trip she won as the Queen of Country Music in 2012.

Other highlights growing up included: Rotary exchange students, netball, science and food. She would love to do a food tour of the world!

Dimity studied Biomedical Science, Nutrition and Public Health; she worked in Pharmacy and Pathology, and now works for Cancer Council NSW as the manager for New England and Northwest.

In 2004 she became an Aunty for the first time; she now has 13 nieces and nephews!

In 2011 Dimity moved back to Tamworth after studying and living in Noosa for a few years.

In 2012 she had the privilege of winning the Tamworth Queen of Country Music Quest, an experience she'll never forget and one that she believes brought so many opportunities.

In April this year Dimity married Robert Betts, also a local, and someone Dimity has known forever! They have a dog, Callie and enjoy spending time on Rob's family farm in Moonbi.

Dimity finished off saying she would like to complete her Masters next year, and in the future wants to buy a house and go to the ballet!

A dangerous idea offers hope for girls in Afghanistan

In 2005, Razia Jan came up with a dangerous idea: to start a free private school for girls in her native Afghanistan. The Taliban were using extreme violence to keep girls from learning. In 2008, the year she opened the school, terrorists in the country -- armed with bombs, poison gas, guns, grenades, and acid -- killed 149 teachers, students, and employees in Afghan schools.

But Jan did not intend to let terrorists stop her. She approached Afghan Ministry of Education officials and persuaded them to donate a piece of land in a village 30 miles outside Kabul. Today, the Zabuli Education Center is in its sixth year and has a roster of more than 400 girls in kindergarten through ninth grade.

Without the school, many of the students never would have had the chance to receive an education. "I can feel a change happening in these girls and in this community," says Jan, who moved back to Afghanistan after building a successful tailoring business in Duxbury, Massachusetts, USA. "Knowledge is something nobody can steal from them."
