

Steve revealed what a great life he has had and that in reality he is a stand-up comic. Well done Steve.

The club has resolved to donate \$2,000.00 to the Rotary Foundation Centenary Project (RFCP) installing water purification units and solar units in approximately 80 schools in India.

Ken Hall is currently preparing a grant application so that money donated can be quadrupled. This is one of the great things regarding the Rotary Foundation.

This should be an outstanding project and there are opportunities for a work team to assist with implementation.

Steve Hawkins-Personal Profile

'Small has characterized my life. I wasn't the first in my family's short but proud linage to be highly influenced by short- My father fitted in a shoe box when he was born- and being born during the depression this was his first bassinette.

I was born in a small hospital in the petite country town of Dorrigo. My family eventually shifted the short distance of 4 miles to the very small village of North Dorrigo. After some time my 3 brothers, and in last position, my sister was born. My parents purchased one of the only two businesses in the village- once again we moved a very short distance- next door- to the Non-official Post Office and Telephone Exchange. My mother ran the Post Office. Dad worked on Telstra.

When I turned 5 it was time to go to school. I had to walk about 100 metres to attend school and yes – it was, in Department of Education speak, a small school- which had a staff that varied between 1 & 2 teachers.

I have such fond memories of that time of my life- For the first month I was so homesick by 10 o'clock each day I would walk around holding the hand of the teacher for the rest of the day.

Eventually I got to read those exciting classics: A Book To Read, Its Fun To Read, Gay Days, and Seaside Stories-A book to which a large number of First Class students in the state could not easily relate. But we did get to meet those unforgettable characters David, Sue and Wendy.

Other educational experiences included mixing the ink in a recycled beer bottle, chopping the wood for the heater and collecting the golf balls the teacher had hit over the main road and onto the local rec ground.

Sometimes we had a number a teachers on the same day- I especially remember the day the teacher rolled his car coming home from the liquid lunch he had consumed in town and his wife kindly filled in for the afternoon session.

Growing up in a village was the best childhood I could have wished for. The entire village was our backyard and every adult member of our community had full parenting rights- which were exercised when necessary. The local tip was an early version of Bunnings and sex education was a very practical, hands-on experience.

High school was in Dorrigo- It was, at that stage, the smallest high school in NSW.

The official name was Dorrigo Rural School- Rural schools were a special class of High Schools- They were too small to be entitled to an Ag teacher, but because agriculture was the dominant local industry an Ag teacher was appointed above the schools normal staffing allocation.

The school did grow somewhat during my time there and eventually we became Dorrigo High School- a we got a shiny new principal- previous to that we had shared the Principal based at the Primary School.

During this time my musical talents surfaced- first the bagpipes and then a guitar- purchased by spending on one day the entire profit from raising poddy calves- our pocket money for our annual holidays in Queensland. Our group was extremely well known on the Dorrigo Plateau. It's surprising how many times you can play the same 6 songs over and over, without receiving a complaint.

After Year 12 I decided I wanted to be a tec. Officer with the PMG. Having won a Cadetship and ,much to my father's disgust, rejected a Teacher's College Scholarship, and headed off to that extremely large city that I knew nothing about-Sydney. Accommodation was arranged near North Strathfield as this was where I was to be trained. When I reported on day 1 the man at the door looked at my ranking, and told me to report to North Sydney Tec. At that stage I didn't even know there was a place called North Sydney. I tried hard for 3 weeks but the country boy was not assimilating well.



Eventually I caved in and headed home. I filled in an affidavit with a series of untruths and was once again granted a teaching scholarship. I was sent to Mitchell College Of Advanced Education in Bathurst instead of Armidale or Lismore Teachers College, as this was the only college that had a mid-year intake. Bathurst was much more my size and for some unknown reason I survived the 3 year course- and met my future bride there.

Jill was several semesters ahead of me so for some time she was teaching and I was a student. This bought many benefits including the fact that I was a kept man-living a lifestyle far beyond the capabilities of the average student. I went to the pub several times a fortnight- not just on scholarship pay day and we occasionally ate in the restaurant instead of having take-away prawn chips.

We were married in my last semester so that we would be posted as a married couple. This bought additional benefits. One being that I now had a shared steady income- I became the only student on campus to drive his own, brand new Holden Torana- you know the type that was constantly winning on the race track next door.

Because of my rather unfortunate experience with highly populated areas, for our fist appointment we applied for anywhere in the state except the greater metropolitan region. Someone understood my plight, decided to send me as far away from Sydney as they could, looked at a map and posted us to Broken Hill.

Had a great time in the Hill and our eldest child, Kris, was born in our fourth year there.

Fond memories of the hill include- looking out the door during a fierce hail storm and, due to a lack of storm water drainage, watched a VW floating down the street.

We went to the highly illegal Tommo's Two-up school one night and saw a person escorted from the premises by the police- because once you had won over a certain amount the police were called to provide an armed guard to take you home.

Broken Hill was at that time a union run town- and the Barrier Industrial Council was the ultimate law. This had a dire effect on your experience when shopping. You see shop assistance could not be sacked and there was very little if any assistance provided by some shop persons.

Next posting was Inverell and our second child Tony was born there.

That changed our lives somewhat more than the arrival of the average child- for, as many of you know Tony was born totally blind and with mild cerebral palsy.

The day after his birth I went to the local community health centre for brochures on the Royal Blind Society, etc. When I told them of my reason for wanting the information I was quickly ushered to a back room for a quiet talk. During the conversation I was told that we seemed to be handling things very well but that sometime in the next 5 weeks we would have a breakdown. This became our catchcry and our crutch, and the focus of much frivolity during the next few months- and no, we never did have that Tony induced melt-down

Small, which had been in the background for sometime raised its head once again and next I was appointed to the small school of Attunga. We lived in the village and yes, after our 3rd move, our third child Grant was born.

My next appointment was to Manilla Central School.

During this time I had a short stint as relieving principal at Bendemeer and liked what I saw.

My next move was back to the big smoke- an appointment to Tamworth West as Executive Teacher. After a short time at West and Mrs Anne Jacob was appointed as principal. I was part of Anne's executive team for several years.

But small was once again calling me. Finally I applied for the small school of Tintinhull and was appointed Principal- of a 1 teacher school. Things had gone full circle and I was once again in a very small school.

Because of my passion for Science, computers and adult education I was seconded to regional office for several periods of time. I was a member of the regional team that trained teachers to implement the Science & Technology Syllabus, to develop Leadership Skills and develop skills in the use of computer technologies in the classroom.

I was Principal representative in computer and technology on both regional and state committees.

During the majority of this period Jill was working at Oxley Vale school. She held a variety of positions including relief teacher, reading recovery tutor and support learning difficulties. It was in the area of Learning Difficulties that she developed an enviable reputation and was recognised with a regional award for her outstanding contribution in this area.



Over the 14 years I was principal of Tintinhull school it grew from 17 students to in excess of 50 and had 3 permanent teachers.

I thoroughly enjoyed managing a small school and could not think of a better educational environment in which to learn and teach.

The school I developed reflected my beliefs and my own aspirations for the education of children. I had created something of which I was extremely proud. I started and finished my 55 years of schooling in small schools. But eventually I turned 60 and it was time for Jill and I to focus on other interests and 2.5 years ago we retired.

Our eldest son Kris and his wife Jenne and their 4 children have recently returned to live in Tamworth. Some of you may have met Kris on a professional basis- He is a highway patrol officer.

Tony lives with us and has a life style program through Challenge. You may have heard Tony on 88.9 FM- He has a 12.30 time slot called Hawko's Hits.

Grant and his wife Bec live in Gulgong, along with their 3dogs, 4 cats, 3 horses, 17 ducks and assorted other animals.

We have 4 grand children who are all extremely bright and talented and obviously destined for astro-physics or brain surgery.

Happily retired- Gardening, photography and travelling now takes up most of our time.'
