Davo & Hawkeye

Guest speakers Davo and Hawkeye spoke on their friendship and the Westpac Helicopter fund raising mountain bike rides they have participated in. A total of 6 of the longer rides plus a number of 1 day captain's rides.

As Hawkeye has lost his sight they ride a tandem bike. Their 1st ride was Wee Waa to Tamworth with the latest ride this year Dubbo to Tamworth.

They have encountered all types of terrain and conditions none more so than on the Cameron Corner to Tamworth ride, a distance of approximately 1500klm over corrugated, sandy and wet roads.

They spoke of the many funny incidents that have happened to them on these rides. From falling off on difficult terrain like the time Hawkeye found himself in front of Davo, albeit on the ground as the bike had jack knifed in soft sand.









NOVEMBER IS ROTARY FOUNDATION MONTH The Rotary Foundation – Grants

This is the third and final article informing members of the workings of our Foundation. There are two types of grants that clubs are able to apply for:

- 1. District Grants
 - This is money that has been returned to the districts as a direct result of donations received by the Foundation from that District. The Foundation returns 50% of money received. The thinking of Australian Rotarians is different to other parts of the world. We expect donations to the Foundation to be from our clubs Rotarians from other countries regard donations to RF as a personal thing. Money donated from 9650 to the Foundation over the last 5 years has actually declined. This severely restricts the amount of money returned to our District for District grants. It is thought our District will have US\$33,500 (AUS \$43000) to distribute for the 2015/16 year.
 - District Grants are therefore block grants that enable clubs and districts to carry out activities in their own communities or elsewhere.
 - Managed by the district
 - Can find projects, Vocational training Teams, Youth Programs, Scholarships, Construction, Cultural exchanges etc.
 - > 75% of projects were undertaken in Australia, 25% overseas.
 - ➢ In the last 3 years in 9650 − 29 clubs have received grants worth AU\$141,000.



- Examples include restoration of community areas along riverbank, supplies for schools in Harare, fitness equipment in parks, scholarships to study in Paris, Green House garden in Nepalese Village, music programs for disadvantaged indigenous students, an upright freezer for Meals on Wheels and water tanks for a Kokoda hospital.
- 2. Global Grants
 - These are designed to fund large-scale humanitarian projects that have high impact and produce sustainable measurable results
 - > They need to have a budget of at least \$30,000
 - > They need to have an international partner
 - > They also need to be within one of six areas of focus
 - -Peace and conflict prevention/resolution
 - -Disease prevention and treatment
 - -Maternal and child health
 - -Basic education and literacy
 - -Economic and community development
 - Theoretically a small amount of club money for a project can be multiplied by utilising both District and Global grants.
- The Foundation's World fund provides a minimum of \$15,000 and maximum of \$200,000. Clubs and districts contribute District Designated Funds (DDF) and/or cash contributions that the World Fund matches. DDF is matched at 100% and cash is matched at 50%.
- > For example if a club has a project with a budget of \$30,000
 - Club could provide \$4000 which is matched 50c in the dollar by the World Fund (\$2000)
 - DDF could provide a further \$12000 which the WF matches dollar for dollar (another \$12,000)
 - The Club then has its \$30,000 budget for the project.
- Some examples of Global Grants in our region are: the Coffs Harbour Club providing clean water in Kirabati, Tamworth Club providing sanitary toilets for girls in India, and Port Macquarie working in Nepal with the development of vegetable gardens in hothouse conditions.

Our club (through the work of Di Ford) currently has submitted an application for a District Grant for our hospital upgrade plans in Kokopo, Rabaul, PNG. Di and I are soon to meet with PDG Ken Hall to discuss a global grant application to compliment this District Grant application.



November is Foundation month in this, the centenary celebration year of the Rotary Foundation. I hope members can appreciate the benefits that this Foundation is able to achieve for the globe. I therefore encourage members to donate to the Foundation by becoming a Centurian (the form is attached). Fifty percent (50%) of all money donated is returned to our District 9650 to be utilised directly in our District grants.
