

Marina Lawrence-personal profile

Marina Lawrence was born on Mother's Day 1984 in Rockhampton. Describing herself as the "everywhere girl", she spent the first 12 years of her life at Comet near Emerald, Walgett, Coonamble and Bellata. She spent an idyllic childhood there learning amongst other things that "that snakes can swim" and "stinging nettles really do sting."

She stayed at Bellata until the middle of year 5 enjoying all things rural and sporting and developed a passion for dancing. Life was very busy and enjoyable. In 1995, the family moved to Pine Ridge to Windy Station. In October 1996, Marina was diagnosed with Juvenile Idiopathic Arthritis which is now called Rheumatoid Arthritis. As debilitating as it is, Marina classes herself as on e of the lucky ones in that she can still walk, has not had a joint replacement and can work full time.





It was now time for High School. She attended Arthritis NSW Camp Footloose on several occasions becoming a group leader (of course!) and found time to be a finalist in the Ministers Young Designer Awards. This was the start of Marina's participation in community events.

In 2001, she travelled to Scotland with her Mum to bury her Granddad's ashes. Unfortunately this trip did not turn out as expected and Marina's Mum was diagnosed with bowel cancer and sadly died a few months later. Refusing to complete Year 12 part time, she finished the year with her friends.

It was then on to Fine Arts and Photography courses and a stint as an Eagle Boys driver. This was followed by a child care certificate and volunteering at Lifeline followed by employment there. She participated in the Queen of Country Music 3 times where she was

given great encouragement from Lynn Windsor. Besides not liking public speaking (who does!) she became a lot more confident in herself as a result of all this.

Travel and obtaining more qualifications now took over. On one of these trips she discovered that she had 4 half brothers and sisters, an adopted brother and a nephew. An instant family!!

Having completed a Diploma in Financial Planning, Marina now works with Bridges and is completing a Graduate Diploma in Financial Planning. On top of all this, she manages to spend time with Jordan at their solar powered house at Moonbi. She also runs the local Arthritis support group and is Treasurer of Tamworth's Financial Planning Association.

Marina loves art, photography, reading, gardening, music, movies, a good laugh at oneself and travelling. She has overcome a lot of hurdles in her life but would not change one thing because these things have defined her.

An amazing and sometimes emotional story from an amazing person.



DECEMBER IS DISEASE PREVENTION AND TREATMENT MONTH Going Overseas – Malaria she'll be right?

Did you know that the medication you take when travelling overseas won't prevent you getting Malaria?

If you get bitten by an infected mosquito you have Malaria. There is no vaccine available to prevent infection. Current medication slows the virus multiplying in your system and gives your body's natural defence time to build up and kill the parasite.

This could take up to four weeks after you return home.

It's easy to forget the need to continue with your medication when you return home, but it is essential that you continue as directed.
