ROBBO'S RAMBLINGS

At the meeting this week we heard first hand from Richard Hardwick of his life story which consisted of 28 years associated with the Army.

Richard has had a number of occupations including an employee of State Rail, a TAFE Teacher, Correctional Services Officer and Disability Worker.

He has been deployed to protect the north west borders of Australia from "boat people" as well as illegal Indonesian fishermen poaching our waters.

He has also had a posting on Christmas Island which is some 3,000 to 4,000 kilometres off the Western Australian coast.

He spent seven months in Iraq clearing roads of bombs and seeing and being involved in horrific mind changing incidents.

He has seen a whole missing generation of young males in Iraq.

Richard openly admits that he has changed since his tour in Iraq and he does suffer from Post-Traumatic Stress Syndrome.

It was an honest and confronting presentation by Richard but something I think we needed to hear so that we can better appreciate the effects of war and understand some of the things we hear in the media and to better understand and support Richard.

Thank you, Richard for your honest and personal presentation. It was greatly appreciated by all of our members.

Richard Hardwick-personal profile

Richard has been a member of our Rotary Club for approximately 4 years. He is married to Cheryl, (about 18 months on the clock) and is currently the HR Manager for Challenge Community Services. He has two children to a previous encounter, a son, Clinton who is a plumber in Dubbo does very well



and a daughter, who has just completed a Degree with Hons in Media & Journalism.

He was born and educated in Dubbo and spent his schooling years in the catholic and public system. His mother is from New Zealand and his dad originated from Cobar. Both his parents are now living in Kootingal. After completing his secondary education in 1988 he left for the big smoke and joined the Department of Railways in Sydney in various administration roles. The job took him to werris Creek and Tamworth. He left the Department and joined TAFE as an IT Teacher which he enjoyed. He taught IT in the jail system, he had a captive audience so to speak, and kids with a disability. He left TAFE and entered the alternative universe of the Army. Spending 5.5 years in the Army and completing two operational deployments.

His first deployment was attached to the Australian Boarder Protection Forces based in Darwin. He worked on patrol boats intercepting illegal immigrants and fishing poachers. Richard also during this time spent some time serving on Christmas Island and watching red crabs do what red crabs do. His second deployment was to Iraq with an Armoured



Unit whose main job was protection and escort of other international forces stationed in Iraq. During this time, he was involved in some serious combat situations and he admits that he was affected by his experiences. It is something a combat soldier cannot easily forget. He was also involved with building educational infrastructure in Iraq and facilities for orphans.

After completing full time service, Richard joined the Reserves, specifically the 12/16 Hunter River Lancers Regiment were he still serves. His main role is preparing Reserve soldiers who have elected to undertake full time operational deployments for a fixed period of time. He also conducted live firing training for the Regiment. The Regiment has a proud history of deployments, some 432 soldiers deploying to all our most recent conflicts such as the Solomon's, Timor, Iraq and Afghanistan. He then joined Challenge and has to this day balanced his family, career and military life as best he can but it does put a strain on the family at times. Richard has dedicated 28 years of his life to the military and has no plans to stop.

Conflict and violence displace millions of people each year. Half of those killed in conflict are children, and 90 percent are civilians.

Rotary makes amazing things happen, like:

Improving quality of life. Rotary members founded the People for People Foundation, which has helped 10,000 families afford food, clothing, rent, utilities, medications, and other necessities.

Raising awareness of bullying. Rotaract clubs in the Philippines conduct antibullying campaigns in schools to teach children how to handle conflict peacefully from an early age.

Protecting domestic violence survivors and their families. The U.S. state of Louisiana has the fourth highest incidence of death caused by domestic violence. Local Rotary members met this issue by helping a shelter provide food, clothing, legal advocacy, and counseling to over 500 women in one year.
