

We had another great meeting this week with a tremendous guest speaker organised by our fabulous program director.

Shalini Pratap spoke to us about her journey from Fiji to Tamworth.

As described by Lawrence Hearn, it was a "great good news story".

Shalini and her husband initially moved from a small village in Fiji to Alice Springs. They had no idea that Alice Springs was located in the centre of Australia. They were totally unprepared, were taken advantage of by an employer and had no health insurance which caused significant financial issues when their first baby arrived. After some hardship, they moved to Tamworth and the community embraced them and in her words their life changed for the better at that time.

We know that Tamworth as a community, is in unique in many ways and this is yet another reason why Tamworth is a growth centre.

Shalini thanked Eddie Whitham for his continuing and ongoing assistance and has now become part of growing and assisting the group known as Multicultural Tamworth.

She is involved in organising the vibrant and colourful Indian festival and helping new migrants assimilate within the Tamworth region.

Significantly, Shalini pointed out that we or our families were all immigrants and whilst she and her husband may be immigrants, her children are 100% Australian.

Hidden Figures was screened on Wednesday evening and was a great success. We had two cinemas booked out. \$5.00 from each ticket sold will go to the eradication of polio. A



very big thank you to Jane Bradford who almost single-handedly organised that fund raising event. It was a great movie and if you haven't seen it, I recommend it.

I am making a last call for registrations to the District Convention in Laurieton between 24 March and 26 March. We currently have seven members registered and I would love to be able to say we have 10 members registered.

Our next major fundraising event is the Pedal the Peel - Cycling Challenge to be held on Sunday, 2 April at Moore Creek Tennis Club.

Shalini Pratap- My journey to Tamworth

At our last meeting we were introduced to a beautiful, fun loving, enthusiastic, energetic

and delightful new Australian.

Shalini arrived in Australia with her husband in 1999. They had come on a visa for 4 years

and went immediately to Alice Springs, where there was a river but no water. In Fiji she

lived on the sea shore, and was educated in a predominately Indian school where there

were no visible racial problems. Alice Springs was interesting. The people were very

welcoming, helpful and generous but the employment was harsh. Shalini discovered that

she was about to become a mum and with no health insurance it was a very expensive

surprise.

With the help of the Department of Immigration, who was very efficient, a new employer

was found and a sponsorship was found in Tamworth. Now it was necessary for Shalini's

husband to gain Australian qualifications, so now he is an electrician and owns AIR

FREEZE REFRIGERATION. Shalini is qualified in IT and "does the books, accounts and

business side of the company". This business is now sponsoring others with 457 visas.

The family has endeavoured to retain some Indian culture with food, the Hindi language

and family events. Divali, the Indian Festival of Light, was developed by Shalini. The baby

is now 16 and very Australian/Western in her outlook. She hopes to study at University

next year.

The family gives a lot of credit to Eddy Whitam, who has supported so many new

migrants in his community work. It is said don't Google, just "Eddy-it". He is the

Tamworth Multi Culture which is a self-funded group of locals who assist with home

visits, English lessons, going for a drive and friendship.














Presidential message

February 2017

On 23 February, we will mark 112 years since the founding of Rotary. It is incredible to think about how much has changed, in our world and in our organization, since the first Rotary club met in Chicago with Paul Harris as a founding member.

Some things are easy to compare between now and 1905. There have been changes in technology, medicine, and society. When we look at a map of the world in 1905 and a map of the world today, we can see what's different. What we can't do is compare what is with what might have been. There is no way to

compare our world as it exists now with the world as it would have been without Rotary.

Rotary has risen to so many challenges in its 112 years. We've answered conflict with peace, and poverty with education. We've responded to a lack of basic health care with projects large and small, from equipping clinics in tiny villages to eradicating polio across the globe.

We will never know how different the world would have been if Rotary had never been founded; if any one Rotary club had never been chartered; or if any single Rotarian had declined the invitation to join a Rotary club.

But I will say, with absolute faith and complete confidence, that the world is a far, far better place now than it would have been without Rotary and that Rotary itself is stronger because of every one of you.

The world needs Rotary more than ever. It needs our courage, our optimism, and our idealism. It needs the voice of tolerance, cooperation, and hope that we can offer. It needs the example of an organization that has proven that the citizens of all countries can work together successfully, gladly, and in friendship.

None of us ever knows the full impact of our actions. None of us knows the effects that will ripple out from the things we do and say, the decisions we make, the opportunities we seize, and those we let pass. But I think we all know that when we choose to do good, good will follow; and that when we choose Service Above Self as our life's path, the direction it will take us will be a good one.

No one can see the future. No one knows what changes lie ahead. But I have faith in Rotary, and in Rotarians, that with every passing year, you will make our world a better place through *Rotary Serving Humanity*.
