

Words of wisdom:

"The total amount of energy we use every year from coal, oil, gas, hydro and nuclear power is dwarfed by the amount of free solar energy hitting our planet every year. The challenge being, can we effectively harness and store it. It is also one of the only energy sources which is not owned by anyone or taxed by the government"......yet !

PRESIDENT'S REPORT

Ron Allen presented a balanced view on the efficiencies and effectiveness of solar power

currently. Some of Ron's key takeaway points were:

- Solar really depends on your situation, your intended time of usage and physical location otherwise it could be a waste of money.
- There is very little financial return in selling your energy back to the grid;
- The best usage for solar is during the day and if you are not at home during the day then you are not using the free energy.
- Authorities are developing the "smart metre" where potentially the authorities can turn off your power and/or charge you more for peak supply.
- Batteries provide a more reliable supply of solar power; however, their lifespan is on current technologies about 10 years with the payback for the capital costs being 12 to 15 years.
- If your premises are larger than a single residential premises you may need a separate room or premises to store the batteries and this is an extra cost and in multi-occupancy developments there may be no extra room.
- There is rapid development in the design and types of storage batteries going on and his advice is to wait another 12 months to see what develops.
- Do not buy solar power installations on price. You get what you pay for. There are many cheap imports that do not meet Australian Standards and there have been over 200 fires in Queensland from non-complying solar products.



- There is also a reasonable percentage of solar systems that do not work however, the owners of the systems are unaware.
- You will never eliminate your electricity bill as half of your account is actually payment for poles and wires.
- Ron recommends you consider time-of-use metering if you are able to schedule your electricity usage to between 10:00 pm and 7:00 am and during the weekend.

This topic generated plenty of interest and as Ron expected not everyone agreed with his views.

The Golf Committee presented a cheque to the Club for \$10,000.00 to form part of our annual funds distribution.

The Golf Committee has continued to be the backbone of the Club's fundraising for many years and the Golf committee members both current and former must be congratulated for their continuing commitment to these continuing events.

GUEST SPEAKER

Ron Allen-solar energy

Introduction and notes: Phil Lyon Thanks: Bruce Hemmett Our guest speaker was Ron Allen (a past President of the Club) who enlightened us on the subject of Solar Energy.

Ron indicated that whilst he did not promote the installation of solar energy for everyone he was not opposed to the use of solar energy in appropriate circumstances.

He indicated that due to the reduction in payment for energy put back into the grid the best arrangement for use of solar energy was where the owner used the solar energy generated during the day before using the grid.

Battery storage of solar energy was improving quickly but had not yet reached an economically viable return. He would suggest that a further 12 – 18 months will see a marked improvement in battery efficiency.

The bottom line with solar energy is that each case needs to be researched prior to installation to obtain the best use of the energy produced at the most economic price.
