# PRESEIDENT'S REPORT 2016-2017

# How is our Club's report card for 2016/17?

The vision that I shared with the club at the beginning of my tenure included:

- 1. Having a fun filled weekly meeting with a positive vibe, great guest speakers and vocational visits and being welcoming and inclusive to our members and guests.
- 2. Encouraging our members to be active and engaged Rotarians and contributors.
- 3. Increasing our social activities for club members and partners in the belief that if there is good social activities, then you will likely also have active and engaged Rotarians
- 4. To encourage members to commit to attending the District Convention in Laurieton
- 5. To reconnect with our child club, Sunrise Rotary club



- 6. Continue to source quality members and introduce a new members kit and mentoring program
- 7. Continue with the Papua New Guinea project and secure a district and global grant
- 8. Promote and support the Rotary Foundation
- 9. Focus on youth programs

### Well how did we go?

Frankly, I am very pleased with our Rotary year however it is only because we have a motivated and dedicated group of directors, chair people and members who are committed to making our club work.

The projects, events and service work that Clubs like First Light Rotary carry out, do not simply happen, it is a combination of many dedicated Rotarians focused on making sure that our club activities are the best they can be. Congratulations to you! You have made me look good. What are some of the highlights?

Club meetings – honestly, I believe that the guest speakers and programs organised by John Fogarty is probably one of the best meeting programs that I have experienced in our club - thank you John. Every meeting was something to look forward to. The vibe in the club is strong and positive and fine Sgt Leslie Hood has administered justice and extracted funds from those most deserving. The meetings have been fun and relaxed which was highlighted when our District Governor, Ian Jackson commented that he began laughing the moment he walked in the door and didn't stop until he left.

Another strong feature was our continued support of **Youth Insearch**. This is an organisation that assists wayward youth to find purpose and meaning in life and to become valuable contributors to our communities. This year with funds principally raised from our Golf trips and the Pedal the Peel cycling challenge we have donated approximately \$23,000 to that very worthwhile cause.

The **Golf committee** have continued to exceed all expectations in organising three golf trips this year and having those trips almost filled to capacity. Their ability to make those trips fun filled and memorable so that past participants continue to come again and again, remains a key feature of their success. This year the Golf Committee donated \$30,000 to the club. Congratulations to the current and past golf committee members.



The **Pedal the Peel Cycling Challenge** took on a different format this year. We invited the Sunrise Rotary Club to join us, to share in workload and also fundraising. I must say that it was a great joint venture and yielded a fantastic result. We firstly reconnected with Sunrise Rotary Club, which was one of my goals. Sunrise is a great club, they have vibrant, enthusiastic and engaged members and they have skills that many of us older Rotarians don't have in terms of technology and we should continue to support Sunrise Club, where ever we can.

In terms of the result, the cycling challenge raised about \$37,000 and we donated \$34,000 to the community. This is more than double last year's Pedal the Peel Cycling Challenge fundraising efforts.

The Science and Engineering Challenge seeks to encourage students to consider a career in the science, maths and engineering faculties by allowing them to experience meaningful, scientific activities which have made a difference in our world, by having them invent and create similar results. We are one of only a few clubs throughout Australia who holds a three-day event catering for not only the high school students but also primary schools' students throughout our district. Over 1000 students participate in the Challenge each year and as a result there has been a positive uptake in students participating in the science, maths and engineering faculties at university.

This year our club elected to take on the full carriage and conduct of the **North West Regional Careers Expo.** For many years the bulk of the work had been carried out by Joblink Plus.

Marina Lawrence who had only just become a member, accepted the position of Vocational Director after having been told that it only involves organising one or two vocational visits throughout the year. Within a few weeks of accepting the position she was the head of the committee organising the Regional Careers Expo which resulted in over 78 exhibitors from all over NSW attending. Approximately 1600 school students from the Tamworth region attended and benefited. Our Careers Expo is believed to be the largest outside metropolitan Sydney in New South Wales. It is a credit to Marina and her committee. I must also recognize and thank the involvement of Charles Impy, who was instrumental in assisting our Club with this project. A further highlight was when our Club was recognised at the **District Convention** and awarded the Vocational Service Award for our continuing involvement in the Science and Engineering Challenge and the North-west Careers Expo.

**RYLA or Rotary Youth Leadership Awards** has continued to grow in strength as the business community starts to recognise the value that the RYLA program imparts to their employees



and subsequently their business. It remains a challenge for us to encourage other Rotary clubs to support RYLA.

Our Louise Matthews is heavily involved in the program and continues to be one of the main promoters and is affectionately known as "mum" by the students. Dwone Jones and Christine Shewry continue to support the program and provide their own inspiring presentations. This year we sponsored one young lady and we're hopeful that she will become a member of our club. What a great result that would be.

Barry Biffin almost single-handedly organised the **RYAG Equine program** for approximately 15 participants interested in the equine industry and he is hard at work organising the next event.

We have a team of Oxley high students attending the **Model United Nation's Assembly** as well as Julia Lim, a student from Calrossy who we will be sponsoring to attend the **National Youth Science Forum.** 

I am certain we have supported our youth this year and why not. They are our future and that is where we need to focus our efforts.

Whilst we often hear of service clubs donating large sums of money from fundraising projects, I don't think we consider what value programs like the Careers Expo, the Science and Engineering Challenge, RYAG Equine, Model United Nations and so on are to our youth and the community. If you simply looked at the cost to conduct those events, it would exceed \$100,000 but the real tangible value arising as a result of those programs for our youth and our communities, that we and other Clubs conduct, is definitely much higher.

**Our International Project at Kokopo** New Guinea. We were successful in obtaining a district grant for \$3,996.00 to assist with acquiring and installing lead shielding for an x-ray machine in St Mary's hospital. The application for a global grant to assist with a surgical recovery room is ongoing. I personally am disappointed that we were not able to get a substantial start on this project and I'm hopeful that next year will see that project come to fruition. We were the first club in our District to give our support to the **District Centennial Project** to provide clean drinking water in 80 State schools in India. We donated \$2000 to this project along with other Clubs. The District then applied for a District and a Global grant, which have been approved. The District now has total funds of \$126,000.00. The result is that the lives of 80,000 school students will be improved. There may be an opportunity for a work party to



visit India in 2018. If you ever needed an example of what a great organization Rotary is and what a great charity the Foundation is, then re-read this paragraph.

The Bulletin is one of the most important and time-consuming tasks in our club. It was taken on by one of our new members Dimity Betts and what a great job she has done. The contents and layout of the bulletin has been excellent, the distribution reliable and it has been a great source of efficient communication to our members. I really enjoyed the different first light sunrises on the title page of each bulletin.

Other club projects and fundraising initiatives were supported by members including:

The Polio movie night- Hidden figures which raised over \$1800.00.

The pub raffle at the Post Office Hotel which raised over \$7000.00

Assisting the Santa Pub Crawl in aid of Ronald McDonald House which raised over \$22,000

Marshalling at the Country Music Cavalcade in January 2017

Assisting at the motor Neuron Disease Ball that raised over \$115,000.00.

Assisting the Cancer Council Dance for Cancer Ball

Catering for the RUOK mental health concert at the Country Music Festival

Conducted a Legacy Fundraiser

Running the bar and gates at the Tamworth Rugby Club

Rotary Bowel Scan program

Donating \$4000.00 to Kairos Outside Women's Ministry

Donating \$8500.00 to Inala House for Cancer Accommodation to update their bathroom fittings

Donating \$3,450.00 for new flooring to the Brain Injury ward at Tamworth Hospital.

From a **publicity** point of view, Deb Barnes has really pushed the club's profile utilising Facebook. After each meeting presentation and each service event, Deb has published photographs and information on Facebook which is being shared and on a number of occasions we have had "hits" which have exceeded 1000.

Further we also received considerable and consistent publicity from the events referred to above in my report including Pedal the Peel Cycling Challenge, Science and Engineering and the Careers expo.

We as Rotarians need to be proud of what we have achieved and not be afraid to let the community know and encourage others to join us and/or support us.



Increasing our social activities was one of my goals this year. In my view, a social club is a healthy club. A number of activities were carried out during the year including lawn bowls, regular catch ups at the Post Office Hotel, a movie night and generally ensuring that our weekly club meetings were an enjoyable and fun filled. The highlight at least from my point of view was the 6-hour lunch and superb food delivered to us at the Glasshouse restaurant at Goonoo Goonoo Station. Thank you, Peter Ryan.

We also had a fantastic and fun filled joint meeting with the Sunrise Rotary club. It is my recommendation that this become an annual event.

**The District Convention** was held in Laurieton in March. We had seven members and their partners attend. That was a much higher number of members who attended than usual and I thank you for supporting me and I know that each of those persons who attended came away enthused and invigorated regarding the power of Rotary.

Particular thanks must go to my ever efficient and reliable **secretary** Helen Tickle and **Treasurer** Jane Bradford. I would not have been able to perform my presidential role without your continued support and assistance. Thank you.

Many thanks must also to Brodie Shields our membership director for developing the **new membership kit and mentoring program**.

I must also give special thanks to Brett White and Peter Ryan for taking on and effectively managing the big club portfolios of **Service and Club administration**.

We have this year we have been involved in projects that have contributed money totalling \$110,000.00. These are detailed at the end of my report.

The dedication of our club Rotarians and their partners throughout the year was both humbling and inspiring to me.

# **ROTARY FOUNDATION**

# **Director-Steve Massey**

- As this was the centenary of the Rotary Foundation, there was a push throughout the
  year to encourage members to donate to the District Centurion Program. The
  Foundation is the most efficient of any charities and half the money donated is
  returned to the District to be used in District Grants.
- 2. **Global Grant** Terry Robinson, Brett White and I intend to push this along next year with some of us visiting PNG in August when Rob Sharpe next goes. Some old plans to refurbish the hospital were located, but found to be too grand and expensive. Current thinking is for a simple extension to provide a recovery room using First Light existing PNG funds. Then the global grant would be used to furnish and finish this area.
- 3. **District Grant** –the club was fortunate to be granted \$3996 from District funds to upgrade X-ray safety at the hospital x-ray aprons for the patients and protective sheeting and lead lined glass for the operators. The total cost of this project is budgeted at \$4862. This is an ongoing project into 17/18.

# Youth – Andrew Beer

From what I understand we managed to gain a little more traction with Oxley High this year, with students participating in the following activities over the course of the year.

- MUNA; Club sponsored 1 team to attend, with 3 teams from Oxley in total attending (Sunrise club sponsored two)
- Public Speaking; As a club we identified two candidates, as we could only sponsor, Sunrise stepped in and sponsored the other. Ironically our representative failed to show on the night, however the other Oxley High student sponsored by Sunrise did well
- National Youth Science Forum; A young lady by the name of Julia Lim from Calrossy has been identified as a suitable candidate and therefore First Light has supported her application. She has requested we assist financially, with the board currently considering her request. Next



step is for Julia to go through the district selection process and if successful will attend the forum in early 2018.

# **RYAG Equine** – Barry Biffin

RYAG Equine invites students in Years 10 to 12 on a two-day camp to enhance their understanding and explore career paths in Australia's flourishing equine industry.

The camp is run by the Rotary Club of Tamworth First Light, with RYAG Equine Committee head Barry Biffin previously in the stockfeed business and now a competitive tent pegger – an ancient equestrian sport related to cavalry practice.

On Saturday morning the students are up at 4:30 am to watch track work at the local racecourse. They also visit the trotting track to watch how a trotter gets their gear on for a race and learn about selecting colt or filly with good prospects. Stewards explain the role they play in a race meeting, whether that be gallops or trotting.

After that, local saddlery owners speak about equestrian merchandise being exported to Australia, such as saddles, equipment and clothing. A stock feed retailer shows the students different kinds of horse feeds available and describes how they are manufactured.

They also visit studs to see the business of raising champions, meeting stallions, broodmares and foals. Workers offer insight into how their equine careers began, their educational backgrounds and the daily life working with and around horses. An equine veterinary clinic gives insight into artificial insemination and general horse husbandry.

The organisers synchronise the camp with one of the many blockbuster equestrian events held at Tamworth's state of the art Australian Equine and Livestock Events Centre. This gives students the opportunity to go behind the scenes and encounter equine staff including trainers, vets and riders in action. In 2016 they were guests at the Quarter Horse Youth World Cup watching riders from all over the world competing with Australians in events like cutting.

Tamworth TAFE is various years have participated through discussing the various training programs available associated with horse industry practice. The Mounted Police have also spoken about what it takes to become one of their team.



There are roughly 300 different jobs centred around horses – from stud management to turf maintenance at racetracks. Our camp aims to give students perspective on the huge amount of career options available to them in the field.

#### **RYLA** – Louise Matthews

D9650 RYLA 2017 was again held at Yarrahapinni Adventist Youth Centre at Grassy Head, 1 – 8 April 2017. RYLA will remain at this facility in 2018 due to an inability to find suitable properties to cater for our needs inland in D9650 at this point in time.

36 participants, 5 leaders & 4 committee members attended Camp. Only 22 Clubs out of 56 in the District were represented, which again is disappointing. Lightning Ridge sent another participant this year & Dorrigo, who unfortunately couldn't field a participant, paid half toward a young fellow from the Backtrack program in Armidale. These tiny Clubs are certainly punching above their weight.

Thank you to RCTFL Board for sponsoring Rhianna Smith & signing off on 5 others who were sponsored by their employers. Brianna Freestone & Liam Rushton-Grace (Joblink Plus), Julia Csanki (Challenge Community Services), Dominique Judd (Tamworth Regional Council) & Jack Dawson (Hopscotch Café).

Huge thanks also goes to our members who contribute as presenters at Camp. Christine Shewry imparts her knowledge & wisdom regarding "What Employers Want" & Dwone DJ Jones tells his "Personal Story" which has a lasting impact on everyone who is privileged to hear it. We are also lucky to have Jenny & Sam Bailey (the quadriplegic farmer from Croppa Creek). Every one of these people give freely of their time because of their belief in this life changing program.

Another thank you to Nic Hinwood from KEO Design (RYLArian 2012 now member RCT Sunrise) for producing a video for use all over the District promoting RYLA & using a number of very familiar faces.
