Guest speaker was Barry Biffin who was introduced by Maureen Thornton and Thanked by Richard Walker

Barry showed slides of Tent Pegging from all around the world. This included a display of flags and Arabs in their full white dress seated on horseback. Some competitors are only 8 to 10 years old.

Tent pegging originated from Military days when elephants legs 'were used as the posts .It was brought to Australia by the Mounted Police. The lancet is 2.2 metres long. However different countries have different lengths. When travelling Barry takes his own lancet and horses are supplied by the host country.

There is a world cup held every two years. Pakistan has very tight security. This was scary with Police everywhere. The Police provided an escort (sirens and all) for the 120 kilometre journey from the Lodgings to the event. Arman has a beautiful ship where welcome dinners are held. Abu Dhabi has all competition inside an airconditioned shed. (Pegs are painted

blue when the sand is white.) Egypt hosted last year.

Tamworth will host the World Cup next year – 4th to 9th January. Six countries will compete with Russia bringing 10 teams. This is the first time in Australia. The competition will be at the Harness club because of the length of field required, It is hoped that TRC will host a Civic Reception.

Basic Education and Literacy Projects on Rotary Showcase

Distribution of 2550 School Desks to 82 Schools

With the help of RI District 9685 and Rotary Clubs of Chatswood Sunrise, Castle Hill & E-Club of Greater Sydney and The Rotary Foundation, 7650 students were able to sit on the benches in their schools instead of sitting on the floor. They were overwhelmed with joy and expressed many THANKS to Rotary for its wonderful gesture. This is one of the BEST PROJECTS executed by our Club in the Centennial Year of The Rotary Foundation.

This project of RC Central Melbourne locates sub-standard primary schools in remote villages in the province of Luang Prabang in Laos. The schools are usually made of simple bamboo or other similar materials and have no clean water, electricity or toilets. We raise the funds in Australia to renovate the school building to Government standard including adding clean water, toilets and electricity. To date we have completed four schools and are in the process of raising funds for the fifth school in the village of Ban Heutan in the District of Chomphet.

Rotary Library (JR Torres Elementary School)

This project aims to enhance students reading skills and development. Initiated by the Rotary Club of Metro Bacolod, District 3850 Philippines and the Rotary Club of Jinju Seonhak, District 3590 Korea, each school beneficiary is given 2 Sets of Desktop Computers and 1000 Pieces of Story Books for Grade 4-6 students. This project is also in collaboration with the different Rotary Clubs in the province of Negros Occidental, Philippines.

District Grant with RC Doncaster to pay for school fees of orphans

An initiative by RC Doncaster (Australia) working with RC Bulawayo South (Zimbabwe) and Vulindlela Guardians to raise funds to pay school fees for 77 orphaned and vulnerable junior school children in Bulawayo, Zimbabwe for 7 years and increasing the numbers by 10% each year.
