

Rotary Youth Studying Astronomy and Related Sciences

Residential Camp for Year 9, 10 and 11 students Thurs 5 - Sun 8 April 2018

The Rotary Club of Coonabarabran Inc will be holding a camp in April 2018 for young people who are interested in astronomy. The camp is known as RYSTARS (Rotary Youth Studying Astronomy and Related Sciences).

It will be held from 4pm on Thursday 5 April to 1.00pm on Sunday 8 April. The camp will provide activities, seminars and workshops run by professional and amateur astronomer's resident in Coonabarabran.

These will include activities such as:

- Learning about, and how to assemble, different telescopes
- Visiting a variety of telescopes in the area, including a guided tour of the 3.9m AAO telescope at Siding Spring and a visit to the 40-inch telescope at 'Milroy'
- Night time observing (weather permitting)
- Experiences with remotely operated telescopes which are situated in different parts of the world.

Accommodation will be at the Warrumbungle Mountain Motel on Timor Rd, with supervision by Coonabarabran Rotarians.

Cost - \$300.00. This covers all meals, travel to venues and entrance fees. Numbers will be restricted to 20 students, and will be allocated on a 'first come, first served' basis. In order to spread involvement across the district and beyond as fairly as possible, it may be necessary to limit applications to two per school.

Arrangements for travel to and from Coonabarabran are the responsibility of the student.

Participants may wish to approach their local Rotary Club about this venture and their interest in attending - some clubs may consider subsidising attendance costs. Nick Bradford and the Nundle Woollen Mills.

Nick and Kylie have owned the Nundle Woollen Mills since 2007. Nick grew up on his parents sheep and cropping property near Deniliquin in southern NSW, He studied at Melbourne College of Textiles, graduated in 1987 and has a career extending for more than 30 years, working for a wool buying and international trading company for 15 years and travelling and buying in many countries around the world. Nundle is home now. It is more relaxed, unfortunately 35 km off the highway but delightful with less than 300 residents.

The mill is the last working mill in Australia processing greasy wool. Most of the machinery is over 100 years old and unique world wide. Although the wool is purchased at auction it all comes from the same grower at Ballaratt. Wool prices are up by 25% but this ensures there will always be a good supply. With the increased prices being paid for fat lambs some of the supply was reduced.



Nick gave a demonstration of the processes the wool goes through before a cone is produced.

He also showed the products available; hats, scarves, socks; Golf shirts; mens' shirts Wool balls. These items are available at other retail outlets too.





The mill has been awarded Tourism recognition at State level in 2014 & 2017 And National Level in 2015 & 2017.
