

Now in its fourth year, Rotarians for Bees – a project of the Rotary Club of Canterbury, Vic – is expanding into New South Wales and the Australian Capital Territory as a project of the Rotary Club of Castle Hill, NSW.

BEES and other pollinators are essential to maintain production of our food crops and are responsible for one in every three mouthfuls of food we eat. Over recent years, there has been an alarming reduction in pollinator populations worldwide. Thanks to Rotarians for Bees, an enthusiastic group of bee champions, many more Rotary clubs and communities are actively engaged in fighting the decline of pollinator

 To educate and engage people of all ages regarding the importance of bees and other pollinators in preserving our food security;

 To promote establishment and maintenance of appropriate habitat; and

 To engage in projects aimed at sustaining and growing bee and other pollinator populations.

Since its inception, Rotarians for Bees has gained enormous support and interest from Rotarians and from the ever-increasing number of people who share a passion for environmental sustainability. The network collaborates with the **Environmental Sustainability** Rotary Action Group (ESRAG) and partnerships have been established with organisations including the Wheen Bee Foundation, bodies representing commercial and recreational

beekeepers, and ACT for Bees.

The Victorian chapter's current projects include sponsoring the best pollinator garden' in the Nursery and Garden Industry Victoria School Garden Competition; sponsoring Wheen Bee Foundation development of pollinator planting guides; and development of music and choreography for the Waggle Dance - an activity to encourage school children learning about bees (rotariansforbees.org/project/ waggle-dance/).

The expansion into NSW/ ACT will play an important role in extending the reach of Rotarians for Bees, coming at a critical time when bees are under threat from an incursion of the destructive varroa mite into NSW.

# Parnell Charity Golf Day – a multi-milliondollar impact

WHEN the Rotary Club of Parnell launched its inaugural Charity Golf Day some 20 years ago, members could never have imagined the initiative would raise \$2.8 million throughout its life span.

To have run the largest charity golf day in New Zealand, have the Prime Minister attend, and be oversubscribed every year is some achievement!

As spoken by the late great Steve Jobs, 'the best way to measure how your success was achieved is to look back at the steps you have taken', The first step was setting the bar high. There are many charity golf days, mostly run by service clubs, that are successful at some level. To stand out the Parnell event needed to be different, to be sought after by participants and sponsors, and be significant and faultless in its delivery.

It proved invaluable that, at the time, one of the club's members was Managing Director of Countdown (Woolworths) in New Zealand. With his introduction and support, along with his successors over the years, the club had access to their suppliers.

Not only did the suppliers pay a significant amount each to sponsor a hole, they also willingly set up and ran food and beverage stalls and activities on their allotted tee boxes. With the golf day run as two separate Ambrose events, one in the morning and one in the afternoon, more than 300 players participated on the day. Each event was followed by either a sumptuous lunch or dinner and auction.

Throughout their 20-year journey, club members learnt the importance of partnerships, planning, presentation and participation.

Partnerships were essential to the event's success – a strong relationship was with Countdown senior management and the Rotary organising team, and a little later with the nominated charity, Dementia Auckland, and its leadership team. Each had a role to play in planning and delivery of the day.

Planning started in the preceding July for a February event, with a detailed blueprint that required a disciplined and methodical approach to ensure every action was planned and every possible eventuality mitigated.

The presentation of the event, visually and operationally, was critical to its success. On the course there were over 80 people from all partners, participating together to operate hospitality marquees, course management, health and safety, and other activities. Team leaders from Rotary managed a task list of over 350 activities that were essential to make sure nothing was left to chance.

The financial outcome was impressive. Parnell Rotary Club's management fee totalled \$358,000, which enabled the club to support many initiatives locally and in the Pacific Islands. The \$2.4 million gifted to Dementia Auckland has had an immeasurable impact on the organisation and the communities it supports. It has provided vital funding for its operating costs, something for which outside funding is difficult, and to assist in delivering services to the Dementia Auckland community.

Unfortunately, the Rotary Club of Parnell Charity Golf Day was a victim of COVID, with organisers stating that its business case no longer stacks up. \*\*\*





## Guest Speaker - Eddie Whitham

## **Multicultural Tamworth**

The service clubs, such as Rotary and Lions have been very helpful and we are grateful for your assistance.

We have no funding. Most of what we do we pay our own way. Our ten person committee has six born from overseas. In the last few years we have commenced Multicultural Gunnedah with the assistance of their mayor, Jamie Chaffey. He, like most in the country knows that we cannot grow the region without migrants. The major task is educating locals that we can live together and we are blessed by the newcomers.

Our City's street festival, Fiesta la Peel has been outstanding this year. We have our tenth festival on 21 October. Rotary have been a part of the nine previous festivals.

Each group of migrants has its own unique culture and religion. When one attends a function, it could be with one hundred to five hundred guests. Our schools, churches, sporting, music and dancing places have had a great boost.

The churches have been very supportive to group who need a hall to meet from time to time.

When you consider the impact the migrant community has had on the city it is like no other place in Australia. I have travelled extensively and many places had a few nationalities, and very little interaction.

What we set out to do has been achieved; to have peace and harmony in our community. Also the spin offs are immense as hundreds have purchased houses, borne lots of children and value added to the region's community.





The State Electorate of Tamworth has, from my count more than 5000 new migrants in the past several years.

Just to see the last two citizenship days where more than two hundred people took the pledge was proof in itself that the plan is working

The number of nationalities represented is more than ninety in this electorate.

The fair percentage of the health and meat processing staff are from overseas. e.g. NSW health systems employ 40%of their workforce from migrants. Thomas foods have 40 nationalities employed today- just over half its work force. TEYS and BAIDA would be similar.

The hospitality industry in all forms relies on visa holders for its viability. In recent years the new Pacific Labour Management scheme has meant that people are coming to work from many of the islands in the Pacific rim for 2-4 years to assist our essential food industry at the farm and manufacturing levels.

Multicultural Tamworth Inc is in their tenth year since formation. We run without staff or much funding. We have an office in the Tamworth Regional library graciously given to us by the Tamworth Regional Council. The people who teach English for us use the library and other groups also connect with migrants there.

The way we operate is to connect and partner with just about everyone in the community. We have no volunteers- we are neighbours for newcomers. That gives us freedom and flexibility. The town's politicians, council, police and health services support us and we assist them with any crisis or matter that arises.





We are constantly fighting to get services to the country and cut the Red Tape that hinders employers and families from enjoying the life we all expect to participate in.

As the immigration slowed over the past three years we have been fortunate to have quality secondary immigration, that is, people moving from other regions to come and settle here.

We are always working to make things better. We are fortunate to have Barnaby Joyce, Kevin Anderson and the Regional Council and their staff, who have listened to us and acted to deal with issues. This is my forty-fifth year working here with refugees, asylum seekers and migrants in general. It has been a great pleasure. The next few years will see the growth of our area so that means migration in one form or another.

For some strange reason Tamworth is not the flavour of the month with federal and state bureaucrats. Armidale, Coffs, North Coast, Wagga and Albury-Wodonga seem to be the plums and get the funding in millions we do not and often fight for a few grand.






