



Rotary and polio in the news Bloomberg News, an international news agency, quoted Carol Pandak, Rotary's director of PolioPlus, in a piece that emphasized the fact that if polio exists anywhere, it is a threat everywhere. The article also highlights Rotary's role in inspiring the start of the Global Polio Eradication Initiative. Punch, a national Nigerian daily newspaper, published an opinion piece by Rotarian Kunle Adeyanju, who rode a motorbike from London to Lagos to raise awareness of the need to end polio. Der Tagesspiegel, a national German daily newspaper, featured PolioPlus National Advocacy Adviser Anne von Fallois in connection with the funding commitment event at the World Health Summit in Berlin. Financial Times quoted Carol Pandak noting that polio anywhere is a threat everywhere in an article published on 23 October. Fox 32 (Chicago) conducted a live, in-studio interview with polio survivor Ina Pinkney for World Polio Day. Pinkney stressed the importance of vaccination, noting that polio is 100% preventable and 100% incurable. NEWS CENTER Maine (NBC affiliate) interviewed polio survivor Ann Lee Hussey about her work to immunize children and featured Rotary information and hyperlinks, teasing World Polio Day. More recently, Hussey was featured on Maine Calling, a live call-in program, along with Janell Routh (epidemiologist, U.S. Centers for Disease Control and Prevention) and Dora Anne Mills (chief health improvement officer, MaineHealth), to share her experiences as a polio survivor and Rotary member.

Guest Speaker — Nina Wrathall

Born UK 1940 in West Midlands Two siblings Normal lifestyle during the war years, Mickey Mouse gas mask carried by all children. Went to School till I was 9 In August of that year went to Trentham Gardens open air swimming pool with the family. On 25 December I woke up to find I was unable to move legs, swallow, or any other body parts Wheezing and gasping for breath. Taken to Hospital and went to Isolation Unit when I was diagnosed as having poliomyelitis. Went into an iron lung for a while and didn't see family because of the contagiousness of the disease. Eventually long time later left iron lung and went into ICU area and after that had OT and physio see me every day Took penicillin jab three times a day for two years. Left hospital unable to stand without caliper on right leg and family was told I'd not walk properly again but I had great aunt who bought me a tricycle. Strapped my right foot on pedal and with a rope she pulled me round and round the local park for hours I walked on coconut matting to get feeling into feet and was very determined person. Eventually when 12 yrs old I went to senior school I never did sport but caught up on my reading and writing. In this time I learned shorthand hieroglyphs and at aged 15 went to work as junior shorthand writer I then went on to pass the Civil Service Entrance Exam so that I could be a shorthand writer for members of the civil service.

I worked for several years as Vet. Sec and also was seconded to Whitehall where I worked as P A to Under Sec Finance. Whilst in London met Father Piotr ?? who was working with the Young Womens Church Association where I was billeted. Was invited by Father Piotr to meet Valentina Teroskova, the first Russian woman cosmonaut We walked to the Embassy and were introduced formally to Mme Tereskova and I met with dignitaries from the Embassy When we departed we took off to the Rectory and had hot chocolate before Father walked me back to YWCA. The next morning was more than interesting ... instead of my boss there were three men from M15 in his office and there I was interrogated for that day and the next as to what I was doing in Russian Embassy, who I knew etc etc I could not answer any of their questions but it was quite a scary interlude.

Met my husband, Leon at MAFF, He was working as Chartered Surveyor and Engineer for the agricultural community for six counties. A different lifestyle followed and I took on his two youngsters of 6 and 3 who came and went back to their mother and her new family. Eventually had Oliver some 6 years later Always wanted to come to Australia and after 13 years persuaded Leon and Oliver to join me as my dependants and we arrived in 1977 in Melbourne — Maribyrnong Hostel — the people there were very helpful and after four days I started work at VCOSS as an Administrator/Sec. We were then able to find a unit in Malvern and Oliver went to school in Jan of 1978. Changed career in June 1978 and worked as Sec to Bursar of Caulfield Grammar School This meant that Oliver went to school there and we drove in together.

Car accident in Aug 1979 and for three months was hors de combat. In the meantime Leon was finding it more difficult to find work, he sold book matches, deck chairs on Brighton Beach, and worked for Marine Artefacts shop in Williamstown where we now lived. We bought an old 1860 weatherboard house which was haunted It had been exorcised but people locally said old bank manager used to live there and his ghost was supposedly still there. On one occasion a friend was in the lounge room and she heard our piano playing, but the piano was locked Eventually Leon went off to Toowoomba to answer an ad for a job when CSIRO in Moorabin phoned that evg and asked if Leon would attend interview on Friday afternoon of that week. As I knew he was returning to Brisbane by train the evg before I got him paged on Brisbane Stn asking him to contact me urgently. He flew from Brisbane to Melbourne and I was there to pick him up and take him to interview that afternoon. The upshot of this was he was offered a position as Experimental Scientist with CSIRO We were very happy and there he worked for six years.

Whilst holidaying in 1983 in UK Leon went off and bought a baby grand piano, where are we going to put it and how do we get it back to Oz were some of my questions All was organised and it came in by ro-ro to Port Melbourne Whilst on a quick jaunt to buy a paper he also sighted and bought the 24 foot steel lifeboat hull from the Wakitane, N.Z. boat. That was delivered on a low loader and deposited in our back yard where it stayed for the next six years till we sold the house and it too.

Leon was on the Utah and Omaha beaches during the Normandie Landings and whilst in St Nazaire he and his captain went for a stroll along the beach when they heard a shrieking whistle and a voice saying Hey guys, did you know that beach is mined! Leon said the two of them retraced their steps very carefully and slowly. Left Australia in 1986 to return to UK We had retained an old barn and a parcel of land when we left and started plans for renovation of this to a house. Took just a year and we stayed there for 7 months before leaving for a tour of Europe to see if we could find somewhere suitable to live. We went to Germany, Italy, Spain and eventually came back to France and eventually settled in Morbihan, Brittany We bought a 96 metre long 16 century barn and Leon





drew up the plans for renovation to B&B status This took 3 years and I learned many skills, such as concreting, plastering, plumbing, laying floor and wall tiles and taught English to French professionals who wanted to hone their skills in the language This I did two evenings a week at FLH, similar to TAFE During the week I took 8 under 5 year old youngsters who came to our home to learn English and that is where I picked up the French language I never did find the time to take formal lessons.

Nina provided us with a few 'interesting' anecdotes – be sure to ask her about her skills as an accomplice to escape from hospital! I'm sure she has a lot of stories to tell us.






















I ran for the first time with my Fitbit on. It detected me running, and asked if my life was in danger, or if tacos were on sale for \$1 again.

I also have a fear of elevators, but I've started taking steps to avoid it.






