Alice Salomon and Alex Hogan from Uniting NSW.ACT's Advocacy Team were guest speakers at the meeting on April 12 to talk about their Fair Treatment for Tamworth campaign. The campaign has been working with the community to call for **better local support and treatment options** for alcohol and other drug use and dependency.

They talked about the origins of Fair Treatment with the story of Marion McConnell, a member of the Uniting church who lost her son to a drug overdose. She recognised the need for more **compassionate**, **evidence-based responses** to alcohol and other drugs that prioritises health and wellbeing. She took her story to the Uniting Church Synod which led to the creation of the campaign. You can hear Marion talking about her experiences here. You can also watch their animation series if you want to find out more.

After they supported another successful campaign pushing for better regional treatment options, local c ommunity members reached out for Fair Treatment to help coordinate a similar campaign in Tamworth

Across the country, up to 200,000 people are turned away from alcohol and other drug treatment servi ces each year — services are either not available or the waiting lists are too long. The need is even mo re dire in rural and regional communities like Tamworth.

In the

Fair Treatment community survey of over 200 local residents of Tamworth and neighbouring regions, 9 8% said the community would be better off with additional AOD treatment and support services.

The team has met with people and organisations across the community and have identified three main priorities for local services: **1.Mentoring program, 2. Local detox and residential rehab, and 3. C ulturally appropriate wellness centre** that provides holistic care and recognises the connections between mental illness and alcohol and drug dependency.


The State Government recently announced **\$358 million** of additional funding for alcohol and drug treatment and support services, with a focus on regional and rural areas in their response to the Ice Inquiry. This has presented an excellent opportunity for the campaign and a pathway to getting resources and funding.

Me when I can't hear someone




