

#### **GUEST SPEAKER**

Our guest speaker Mark and Allen from TOIM spoke to us about the importance of cyber security. Since the war in Ukraine, an increase in the intensity and severity of cyber-attack has been felt worldwide. Major companies, such as Telstra and Medibank are under threat and may not be able to protect the personal information of their clients. New "data breach" regulations are protecting individuals, by imposing fines on companies that fail to notify, declare and prevent future cyber-attack. Fines of up to 30% of the company revenue might be issued.

Since last financial year, an increase of 13% in the number of reports has been recorded by Australian Cyber Security Council ACSC). A cyber crime is being reported every 7 minutes and 69 calls a day are being made for assistance. Companies are not the only target, individuals are also at risks. Hackers can access personal information via a person modem.

What can you do? Increase the protection of remote workers that are particularly at risks, update all software and devices with the latest updates, become a partner of the ACSC and contact an independent business, such as TOIM, that can audit your organisation for potential threats.

Make sure you also verify the name of the person and/or organisation that is contacting you and do not click on a link until you are certain of its origin or click on link directly from the website. You may also store important information on an external drive and/or use a password manager.

#### Editor's note on cybersecurity

In today's digital world, complacency on matters of cybersecurity is not a viable option. Large, automated attacks can reach thousands, and in those instances, the attackers are working on a game of probabilities to see a financial gain from unsuspecting victims. The best way to protect against risk is <a href="knowledge">knowledge</a>. The below information forms part of my own workplace's training on the matter, which may also be a benefit for understanding how you can avoid becoming a victim.

#### What is phishing?

Phishing is one of the easiest forms of cyberattack for criminals to carry out, and one of the easiest to fall for. It's also one that can provide everything hackers need to ransack their targets' personal and work accounts.

Phishing is usually carried out over email - sending you a tempting message and inviting you to open a file or click a link. If you do so, it can enable the attacker to get a foothold in your environment — on your phone, your PC, or making them able to use your information for other illegitimate activities (eg identity fraud/theft).



The 'scam' has spread beyond suspicious emails to phone calls (called 'vishing'), social media, messaging services (aka 'smishing') and apps. These scams don't always have links or attachments either; sometimes it's plain, old-fashioned fraud, a confidence trick ('social engineering'- playing on your good nature as a human, using pure psychology)

The basic aim of any phishing attack is to trick the target into doing what the scammer wants.

#### Why does phishing matter?

Phishing can have real life impacts, often financial.

In the case of ransomware, the scammer may encrypt your valuable data and demand a ransom payment to get it back. Another type of phishing known as Business Email Compromise, the fraudster impersonates a real person in an organisation, or known acquaintance, and attempts to convince employees and individuals to redirect funds from a legitimate to a criminal bank account - they can be very convincing type of scam. Phishing really matters!



#### How to avoid being a victim

Just following a few simple tips will help you:


- Is it external? Treat all external emails from unknown senders with suspicion.
- Watch for emotions. Phishing emails usually use greed, curiosity, urgency or fear to tempt you to react.
- Check for inconsistencies:
  - o Does the email address look right? Is it exactly the same as you've seen before?
  - When you hover over links, do they look suspicious? (Look for the link address in the bottom LHS of your browser)
  - o If you know the contact, is the language they use typical or unusual? Spelling mistakes, phrasing that is 'just not right'.
  - o If you don't know the contact, were you expecting the email? Consider reaching out to them directly via your own contact info (not via their weblink or reply email) to confirm the matter.

If any of the above raise your suspicions, proceed with caution. If you think it's phishing, don't act!




